ἐνεργής [energēs] — an active (word from which we get the English word,

- Paul is praying that Philemon's forgiving of Onesimus (an act of participating in faith) will

A Blessing (v. 6b)								
1. Full Knowledge: One word in Greek; ἐπίγνωσις [epignōsis]

2. Every good thing which is in you: "Good Thing;" ἀγαθός [agathos]								
Refers to the found in Philemon (such as faith and love).								
 The "good" which God has graciously given to you is more fully grasped and 								
realized when you experience them (by operating from them) in the fellowship of								
the faith.								
3. For the sake of Christ: We are given these graces, and act on them for one								
overarching purpose: the of Christ.								
The personal blessing that Paul prayed would come from Philemon's forgiveness would								
be a fuller of God's gracious in him.
