JESUS ON INJUSTICES Matthew 5:38-42

REVIEW

INTRODUCTION

- Jesus is addressing how God's kingdom responds to various forms of injustice.
- Bryce Morgan suggests that the focus of Jesus' following instruction relates to:
 - When your spouse tries to take your joy with their criticisms and naysaying.
 - When a self-involved person tries to insert their agenda into your life.
 - When a neighbor tries to take advantage of your offer to 'lend a hand.'
 - When a coworker takes credit for your commendable efforts.
 - When a friend wants to take out another loan from the "First Bank of You."
 - When a disgruntled associate takes potshots at your reputation via social media.
 - When someone in need is looking to take whatever you can offer.

YOU HAVE HEARD

Matthew 5:38 (NKJV) "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.'

- Jesus' quote is found in multiple texts in the Old Testament (Ex 21:24; Lev 24:19-20; Deut 19:21).
- This was known as the "Law of Retaliation" or "Lex Talionis."
- This was given to limit excessive punishment and ensure that "the punishment should fit the crime."
- The Rule of Law was to govern society, rather than vendettas, leading to a neverending cycle of vengeance and chaos. (HATFIELD AND MCCOYS)
 - Human justice and restoration matter, but they were to be applied by God's rules.
 - And God's standard was to ensure proportionality to the crime or violation.
- So, Jesus summarizes an Old Testament law that was to guide judges in proportionate justice.

BUT I SAY

- Before we get started, in Jesus' responses, He is not addressing:
 - the abused wife or child and telling them to suck it up and bear up under abuse,
 - or law enforcement, telling them to ignore criminal activity,
 - a government leader, or a military general, or the head of a company's HR department, who would be responsible for the safety and well-being of a nation or corporation, or company.

- He is addressing the individual who is in God's kingdom and instructing the individual on how they should respond in personal situations when something is being taken from them such as:
 - Honor
 - Basic necessities
 - Time and energy
 - Money or property

Handling Insults

Matthew 5:39 (NKJV) But I tell you not to resist an evil person. But whoever slaps you on your right cheek, turn the other to him also.

- A slap in the face stings, it is insulting, and it speaks to indignity. A simple slap is not
 typically regarded as being physically damaging.
- Yet, the natural reaction is to slap back.
- The slap does not have to involve literal, physical violence.
 - Even in our day, a "slap in the face" is a metaphor for an insult or offense.
- Jesus is saying that the Kingdom way is not to retaliate.
- In this, Jesus communicates that the actions and attitudes of others do not control us so that we respond in like-kind.
 - Instead, God's life and kingdom values control us.
 - We are distinct, we are light, we are salt.
- Blessed are the merciful!
- Jesus is saying, instead of returning evil for evil, overcome evil with good.

Romans 12:21 (NKJV) Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

Proverbs 24:29 (NKJV) Do not say, "I will do to him just as he has done to me; I will render to the man according to his work."

The following Scripture Paul provides the qualities of Kingdom Character.

Romans 12:17–21 (NKJV) Repay no one evil for evil. Have regard for good things in the sight of all men. 18 If it is possible, as much as depends on you, live peaceably with all men. 19 Beloved, do not avenge yourselves, but rather give place to wrath; for it is written, "Vengeance is Mine, I will repay," says the Lord. 20 Therefore "If your enemy is hungry, feed him; If he is thirsty, give him a drink; For in so doing you will heap coals of fire on his head." 21 Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

- Such a response establishes you as a person of authority and strength.
 - This is a kingdom posture made possible by kingdom strength by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Handling Lawsuits

Matthew 5:40 (NKJV) If anyone wants to sue you and take away your tunic, let him have your cloak also.

- If someone makes a claim against you, give them what they ask for and more.
- Instead of lawyering up against your neighbor, settle out of court and offer them more than they are demanding.
- This is not how you respond to a con-artist, but how you provide a Kingdom testimony to your neighbor and friend.
- A shirt and coat were valuable in the day; in fact, essential as the coat protected them from the night air and provided bedding for them.

Handling Exploitation

Matthew 5:41 (NKJV) And whoever compels you to go one mile, go with him two.

- Under Roman law, a Roman dignitary or authority could demand that lower-class people assist them by hauling their luggage or equipment one mile.
- Naturally, people begrudged this inconvenience and loss of time to walk two miles (one there and one back).
- This was especially true if they resented Rome to begin with, as many Jews did.
- Jesus tells His disciples that any time a Roman official forces you to go one mile, do not go with him begrudgingly or because you 'have to' (v 41).
- Instead, you should go with him for two miles (actually four—two miles with and two
 miles on the return).

Handling Borrowers Requests

Matthew 5:42 (NKJV) Give to him who asks you, and from him who wants to borrow from you do not turn away.

- Here Jesus instructs not to turn away from the person who wants to borrow from you but rather be willing to lend.
- Here, God's kingdom is characterized by its constituents generously seeking the well-being of others, as seen in an Old Testament proverb.

Proverbs 3:27–28 (NKJV) Do not withhold good from those to whom it is due, when it is in the power of your hand to do so. 28 Do not say to your neighbor, "Go, and come back, and tomorrow I will give it," When you have it with you.

- Jesus contrasts this heart of generosity with the attitude of legal proportionality.
- Jesus' kingdom does not merely seek to follow the law and assert their legal rights, making sure everyone gets their just due.

In His Life

- Jesus suffered insults, exploitation, and lawfare. The legal system was used as a weapon against Jesus.
- How Jesus directs those in His kingdom to live, He modeled for us.
- Peter speaks to this in his first letter.

1 Peter 2:23 (NKJV) who, when He was reviled, did not revile in return; when He suffered, He did not threaten, but committed [entrusted] Himself to Him who judges righteously;

Jesus lived out what He taught throughout His life and ministry!

In His Death

- It was in the suffering around His death that Jesus' kingdom model for responding to injustices shone the brightest.
 - 1. Jesus was struck across the face.

Matthew 26:67 (NKJV) Then they spat in His face and beat Him; and others struck Him with the palms of their hands,

 How did He respond? He offered not only His other cheek, but His head, back, hands, feet, side, to the point of spilling His blood.

1 Peter 2:24 (NKJV) who Himself bore our sins in His own body on the tree, that we, having died to sins, might live for righteousness—by whose stripes you were healed.

2. He willingly offered up His garments, all of them.

Matthew 27:35 (NKJV) Then they crucified Him, and divided His garments, casting lots, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophet: "They divided My garments among them, And for My clothing they cast lots."

• In exchange, He gives white robes of righteousness.

Revelation 7:9 (NKJV) After these things I looked, and behold, a great multitude which no one could number, of all nations, tribes, peoples, and tongues, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed with white robes, with palm branches in their hands,

- 3. Directed to walk carrying His cross. And He went more than the second mile!
 - He went all the way to receiving God's judgment against our sin.
- 4. Always called upon to give.
 - His throne room is always open and His arms wide to receive us.

Philippians 4:6 (NKJV) Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God;

- Jesus set forth the model for kingdom culture! It is one of generous mercy and grace.
- Did Jesus respond to injustices the way He did out of weakness and pacifism?
 - He had infinite, omnipotent resources and power at His disposal.
 - His responses were out of strength!!

APPLICATION


- The concept of "turning the other cheek" is a difficult one for us to grasp. Allowing a second slap after being slapped once does not come naturally.
- This requires true transformation, versus mere religious rule-keeping.
- Turning the other cheek does not imply pacifism, nor does it mean we place ourselves or others in danger. (Jesus and Paul both escaped danger.)
- He was not setting government foreign policy, and He was not throwing out a judicial system of justice.
 - Crimes can still be prosecuted, and wars can still be waged to protect a nation.
 - But the follower of Christ need not defend his personal "rights" or avenge his honor.
- Jesus flips the world system of 'justice' on its head.
- This is at the heart of His kingdom. This is the mercy principle Jesus shared in the Beatitudes: "Makarios (blessed) are the merciful for they shall receive mercy."

Spiritual Transaction

- 1. Humble ourselves before God regarding those who have offended or violated us?
 - To demonstrate the grace Jesus has shown and extended to us.
 - Any person or situation stand out that you need to
- 2. Confess ways that you have been exacting and harsh in reprisal toward others (name them), little or no mercy or grace, instead of the generosity which we have received from Jesus.
- 3. Shine as light under the exploitation of others.

May others see the light of Jesus' grace through the grace we offer them.




