

5-Day Devotional: Available: Living a Life Interrupted by God

Day 1: The Interruptible Life

Reading: Mark 5:21–34

Devotional:

How often do we push through the day with our heads down, locked onto our own agenda, never lifting our eyes to the souls around us? Jesus was on an urgent mission, as a child was dying, yet He stopped. He noticed. He was interruptible.

The same Spirit who lived in Jesus lives in you. The question is not whether God is speaking. The question is whether you are listening.

Today, slow down long enough to notice the person in the waiting room, the coworker eating alone, or the neighbor who never waves back. God does not always call you to a stage. Sometimes He calls you to simply turn around.

Reflection:

What is one thing on your agenda today that you could surrender to make room for a divine interruption?

Day 2: The Cost of Inconvenience

Reading: 1 Kings 19:19–21

Devotional:

Elisha left his oxen and livelihood behind to follow the call God placed on him through Elijah. He did not ask for a transition plan or negotiate a safety net. He slaughtered his oxen, burned his equipment, and walked away from the life he had always known.

God rarely calls us into comfort. He calls us into faithfulness. The prophets Elisha, Amos, and Ezekiel all left established, secure lives to carry a word they did not choose. William Tyndale translated Scripture with blistered fingers and died before seeing a single result.

Inconvenience is not a sign that you missed God. It is often confirmation that you found Him. What comfort are you holding onto that may be keeping you from the call?

Reflection: Is there an area of your life where convenience has quietly become a higher priority than obedience?

Day 3: The Secret Place and the Intentional Life

Reading: Romans 12:1–2

Devotional:

Intentionality does not begin with a planner or productivity system. It begins in the secret place. When you give God the first fruits of your day, He reorders your priorities from the inside out.

The noise of life, including to-do lists, schedules, and the cycles the enemy sets and forgets, will always rush in to fill the silence. But when you sit before God and surrender your agenda, He provides what you need for that day. Not tomorrow. Not next year. Just today.

Like manna in the wilderness, His provision is daily, and His presence is enough. Stop reaching for Egypt. The bread of heaven is already here.

Reflection:

What does your current morning rhythm look like, and is there honest space in it for God to speak?

Day 4: Joining What God Is Already Doing

Reading: Isaiah 6:1–8

Devotional: Isaiah did not volunteer out of ambition. He responded out of encounter. He had seen the Lord, high and lifted up, and that vision dismantled every personal agenda he had carried through the door.

True availability is not manufactured through discipline alone. It is born in God's presence. Sometimes the most faithful thing you can do is not start something new, but humbly join what God is already building through someone else.

The Kingdom does not need more platforms. It needs more people who say, without condition or negotiation, "Here I am. Send me." Let your encounter with God be the source of your yes.

Reflection:

Is there a Kingdom movement already happening around you that God may be asking you to join rather than lead?

Day 5: Obedience Over Sacrifice**Reading:** 1 Samuel 15:20–23**Devotional:**

Saul convinced himself he had obeyed. He kept what was useful, discarded what was not, and dressed his disobedience in the language of worship.

This is one of the most dangerous places a believer can occupy: sincerely believing your will and God's will are the same. The difference between Saul and David was not the absence of failure. It was the presence of repentance. David fell hard, but he fell on his face before God.

Acknowledgment is where transformation begins. Today, ask the Holy Spirit to reveal any area where you have been selectively obedient, where you have obeyed in ways that suited you and quietly set aside the rest.

Reflection:

Is there a word God has spoken over your life that you have edited, added to, or quietly set aside in favor of your own version of the plan?
