- e. Why should you find ALL people interesting?
- f. Why is listening well to others a sign of your spiritual maturity?
- g. How does poor listening point to your pride?
- h. If you say the sweetest things to people, but won't take time to listen to them, what will be the impact of your kind words *over time*? Why?
- 8. Why is it helpful to think of a conversation like a tennis match?
