Message and Questions: John Brewer

Proverbs 1 addresses a topic that is central to the rest of Proverbs and ultimately central to all of scripture. "The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge (Proverbs 1:7a)." This proverb encourages future generations to seek true wisdom from God and warns against being drawn away with the distractions of the world.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What does it mean to "Fear God?" Have you ever found this concept uncomfortable? Why is this concept so often uncomfortable? Reference Proverbs 1:7,28-29, Matthew 10:28, and Hebrews 10:31.
- 2. Proverbs 1 and much of scripture contain bold warnings about getting drawn away from Godly wisdom into the ways of the world. Why is this warning given? Hint: what happened to Solomon? How do we resist being drawn away?
- 3. How do we get loving correction, and why should we welcome it? Reference Proverbs 1:8-9,23-25, Proverbs 27:6.
- 4. Solomon asked for wisdom and received it from God (1 Kings 3:5-9). What happened to Solomon later? Reference 1 Kings 11:1-3. If God's chosen wise king could not fear God first, what hope do we have to find Godly wisdom and resist being drawn away? Reference Matthew 12:42 and 1 Corinthians 1:22-24.
