Lesson 3

The Source of Rest Hebrews 3:1-4:13

Remember that Hebrews is a letter of encouragement to believers, sprinkled with warnings to those who were in danger of drifting away from the truth about Jesus without responding to Him in saving faith. Even those who have already received salvation from Christ, may be in danger of falling away from Him in some ways – not from His salvation but from the abundant life that Christ intends for believers (John 10:10).

"Come to Me, all who are weary and heavyladen, and I will give you rest."

Matthew 11:28

Ask the Lord, who promises to give us help, to show you His will for you in response to His Word this week.

Jesus' Superiority to Moses

The author of Hebrews now compares Jesus to Moses, who was extremely important in the heritage of the Jews to whom the author was writing.

Read Hebrews 3:1-6.

- 1. What do you learn about Moses' character in the following verses?
 - Exodus 2:11-15 (If you aren't familiar with the story of Moses' birth and upbringing, take some time to also read through Exodus 2:1-10.)
 - **❖** Exodus 3:1-10
 - Exodus 4:10-16
 - **❖** Exodus 33:11a
 - ***** Exodus 33:17-23



- 2. Reflecting on what you know about Jesus and Moses and what you learn in Hebrews 3:2-6, in what ways do you think Jesus and Moses are similar? In what ways is Jesus better than Moses?
- 3. Read Ephesians 2:19-22 and 1 Peter 2:4-5. What do you learn about God's house?

God's Rest

After Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt, they spent forty years in the Wilderness before Joshua led them into the Promised Land. During that time, the Israelites tested and tried the Lord with their lack of trust and belief in Him. The author of Hebrews uses those Israelites as an example for the recipients of his letter.

Read Hebrews 3:7-19.


- 4. In Hebrews 3:7-11, the author is again quoting from the Old Testament scriptures to emphasize his point. Read Psalm 95:7b-11.
 - ❖ In Numbers 14:20-24, where were the Israelites physically not allowed to enter?
 - How do the author of Hebrews and the psalmist describe God's response to the disobedient and unbelieving generation of Israelites in the Wilderness (Hebrews 3:11 and Psalm 95:11)?
 - * What parallel do you see between rest and the Promised Land in these verses?
- 5. From Hebrews 3:12-17, how does the author encourage us to avoid missing God's rest?
- 6. In Hebrews 3:15, he repeats the admonition from Psalm 95:7-8, "Today, if you would hear His voice, do not harden your hearts." What do you think it means to harden your heart?



In Hebrews 4, the author elaborates on the concept of rest.

Read Hebrews 4:1-13.

13. What are the author's admonitions regarding rest in Hebrews 4:1 and 11?



23. How does the Lord's intimate knowledge of your heart encourage you to find rest in Him?

Prepare for Life Question:

Jesus knows our hearts completely and perfectly. He sees our burdens, our fears, our secrets and our longings. Because of Jesus' completed work on the cross, we can come to Him and find rest in His presence for our weary and burdened souls.

24. Take some time this week to come before Him and rest in His Presence, knowing you are perfectly known, perfectly loved and that your salvation has been perfectly provided.
