Moving to "spirit," the Hebrew "ruach" means breath, wind, or spirit, and similarly, the Greek "pneuma" indicates wind or spirit. These terms highlight the Holy Spirit's unseen, immaterial nature. You can see the effects of the Spirit, but not the Spirit Himself.

The Holy Spirit's Role in the Trinity

The Holy Spirit is frequently mentioned in Scripture as the third person of the Trinity, called interchangeably the Spirit of God, the Spirit of the Lord, the Spirit of the Father, and the Spirit of Jesus. This multiplicity of names underscores His integral union with the Father and the Son. Despite the distinct roles within the

Trinity, the Holy Spirit shares the same essence and operates in perfect harmony with God the Father and Jesus the Son.

In John 14:9, Jesus states, "If you have seen me, you have seen the Father." Likewise, in John 16:14-15, He explains, "He shall glorify me, for he shall take of mine and shall disclose it to you. All things that the Father has are mine; therefore I said, He takes of mine and will disclose it to you." This scripture emphasizes the unity and interrelation of the Trinity.

1. Genesis 1:2 - *Spirit of God*

2. Judges 6:34 - *Spirit of the Lord*
"So the Spirit of the Lord came upon Gideon; and he blew a trumpet, and the Abiezrites were called together to follow him."
3. Matthew 10:20 - *Spirit of your Father*
"For it is not you who speak, but it is the Spirit of your Father who speaks in you."
4. John 14:17 - *Spirit of Truth*
"That is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it does not behold Him or know Him, but you know Him because He abides with you, and will be in you."
5. John 15:26 - *Helper*
"When the Helper comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, that is the Spirit of truth, who proceeds from the Father, He will bear witness of Me."
6. Acts 1:5 - *Holy Spirit*
"For John baptized with water, but you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."
7. Acts 16:7 - *Spirit of Jesus*
"And after they came to Mysia, they were trying to go into Bithynia, and the Spirit of Jesus did not permit them."
8. Romans 1:4 - *Spirit of Holiness*
"Who was declared the Son of God with power by the resurrection from the dead, according to the Spirit of holiness, Jesus Christ our Lord."
9. Romans 8:2 - *Spirit of Life*
"For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death."
10. Romans 8:15 - *Spirit of Adoption*
"For you have not received a spirit of slavery leading to fear again, but you have received a spirit of adoption as sons by which we cry out, 'Abba! Father!'"
11. Revelation 19:10 - *Spirit of Prophecy*
"Then I fell at his feet to worship him. But he said to me, 'Do not do that; I am a fellow servant of yours and your brethren who hold the testimony of Jesus; worship God. For the testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy.'"
12. Revelation 22:17 - *Spirit and the Bride*
"The Spirit and the bride say, 'Come.' And let the one who hears say, 'Come.' And

let the one who is thirsty come; let the one who wishes take the water of life without cost."
