3. What reason did the elders give for wanting a king (see verses 4-5, 19-20)? Despite their stated desire, what were they *really* doing (verse 7)? In what ways are we often guilty of doing the same thing?
4. When are you tempted to want or to do something just to be like 'everyone else'? What might this desire say about how you view God?
5. Each time Samuel heard something from the people that would upset, anger, or hurt him, how did he respond? What do we stand to learn from his response to this adversity?
6. Samuel warned the people that the king they would pursue would be a taker - but they wouldn't heed his warning. In what ways are the systems of the world 'takers'? Contrast this with how Jesus is a giver.
