

(1 Samuel 15:1-35)

1.	When situations seem out of control, remember the <b>SOVEREIGNTY</b> of God. (Isaiah 45:7-9; Psalm 147:5; Colossians 1:16-17; Proverbs 16:33; Job 42:2; Lamentations 3:37-39)
2.	When God speaks, PAY CLOSE ATTENTION and DO what He says! (Exodus 19:5; 1 Samuel 15:22; Deuteronomy 11:1,13; Isaiah 1:19; John 14:15, 15:14; 2 John 1:6; Luke 11:28)
3.	TIME is of no significance to God - He created it! (Romans 12:19; Isaiah 55:8-9, 57:15; 2 Peter 3:8; Revelation 1:8, 22:13)
	Elements to keep in mind regarding God's difficult directive:  (Ezekiel 33:11; 2 Peter 3:9; Genesis 18:23-33)

4. <u>PARTIAL</u> obedience is disobedience. (*Deuteronomy 25:17-19; Exodus 17:14-16, Numbers 24:20*)

5.	We can treat obedience to God like the game of horseshoes: when we are really close, we are doing pretty good. But why is this not true? Why do we feel that if we are being obedient in the 'big things' that we are doing fine?
