# Living Faithfully: Living as Jesus' Disciple in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century

Week 2: Faithfully Unashamed

Introduction: 2<sup>nd</sup> Timothy 1:8-18

EXCERPT: Exalting Jesus in 1 & 2 Timothy and Titus by David Platt.

Do not be ashamed of your Lord. Instead, embrace the passion of Polycarp, who refused to renounce Christ in the face of impending martyrdom. He said, "Eighty and six years have I served Him, and He never did me any injury; how then can I blaspheme my King and my Savior?" 19 Today we have all kinds of conflicting and competing ideologies.

One of the more prevalent worldviews cultural analysts have recently described is "moralistic, therapeutic deism" (Smith and Denton, Soul Searching). This is the belief that if people "do good," "feel good," and "believe in a god" (one who created the universe but is not really involved in the affairs of life), then there is a heavenly future awaiting them. The idea that we are actually "bad" and in need of a Savior is viewed as ignorant, primitive, or simply foolish.

Other worldviews have emerged, such as the new atheism. This militant brand of atheism rejects not just God but even rejects a respect for belief in God. Further, the continued growth of other world religions, many of which are hostile toward Christ followers, makes Paul's charge to Timothy in verse 8 all the more relevant. Remember Jesus' own words:

For whoever is ashamed of Me and of My words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will also be ashamed of him when He comes in the glory of His Father with the holy angels. (Mark 8:38)

Notice that the Savior says not to be ashamed of Him or of His words. Many will mock both the person and the words of Jesus. Gospel-centered bravery, on the other hand, requires that we take our stand with Jesus and His teachings and let the chips fall where they may.

**The Big Picture:** When we are not ashamed of Jesus we live out the Gospel faithfully even when hard times come because of our faith.

## Open:

 Have you ever felt ashamed or been embarrassed because of Jesus? What about other Christians? How does this feeling affect the way you live with others?


## Discuss:

Read 2<sup>nd</sup> Timothy 1:8-18. Review the sermon. Write down any questions you have or any statements that stood out to you.

At Cornerstone, we believe the following six values will help you live faithfully to Jesus in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: grace, growth, gather, gifts, generosity and goodness. These shaping values lead our discussion points.

- Grace: Experiencing Regular Renewal and Refreshment through the Spirit
  Pastor Jeremy said, "Religious people find God useful, but Jesus-followers find the
  Gospel beautiful." Describe the difference between religious people and Jesusfollowers.
- Growth: Learning from and Applying the Word of God to My Everyday Life
  Read v. 13 again. What is sound, or healthy, teaching have you received from this
  Scripture reading or from Pastor Jeremy's teaching in this passage that encourages
  your faith today?
- Gather: Experiencing Christian Community and Gospel Renewal with Others
  How does connecting in community with other Christ-followers help "guard the
  Gospel"?
- Gifts: Applying My Time and Talent for God's Glory and the Benefit of Others
  Paul writes that "this grace was given to us" (v9). How do we steward this grace as a
  gift toward others?
- Generosity: Honoring God by Sharing My Resources to Benefit Others
   Read verses 16-18 again. How does Onesiphorus model generosity for us today?
- Goodness: Expressing the Gospel at Work through Love and Good Deeds

  How does suffering for the Gospel show goodness to people who live far from God?
