Maundy Thursday beginning the Great Three Days

Our liturgy this Maundy Thursday ushers us into The Great Three Days ("Triduum") at the center and heart of the Christian year and the Christian faith. During these days we do more than remember, we reenact and participate in the death and resurrection of Jesus our Lord. And we do such not individually, but together as the community of people who are washed in the blood of the Lamb and already raised to new life in Christ.

Our service this night is comprised of three distinct liturgies. In the **Service of Reconciliation**, we complete the Lenten journey begun on Ash Wednesday when ashes were pressed upon us with the words "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." The confession of that Ash Wednesday, leading us into forty days of reflection and change, is completed in the individual absolutions spoken in this liturgy.

The second liturgy of this night is **The Supper of Our Lord**, in which we participate with Jesus' disciples in that Last Passover he shared with them and discover anew our Eucharistic roots on that night in which he was betrayed.



The third and final liturgy of our service, the **Stripping of the Altar**, ushers us into Good Friday, as the altar and chancel are stripped of all ornaments during Psalm Twenty-Two, "My God, my God, why have your forsaken me?"

SERVICE OF RECONCILIATION

PRELUDE

CALL TO WORSHIP

Jesus said: I give you a new commandment, that you love one another.

Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another.

On this day, Christ gathered with his disciples in the upper room.

On this day, Christ took a towel and washed the disciples' feet. On this day, Christ broke bread for his disciples, telling them to eat.

On this day, Christ poured out wine, telling them to drink of the cup of new life.

On this day, Christ gave his whole self, that we too might follow and find abundant life.

CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS*

Friends in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the struggle to which we were called at baptism.

Within the community of the church, God never wearies of forgiving sin and giving the peace of reconciliation. On this night let us confess our sin against God and our neighbor, and enter the celebration of the great Three Days reconciled with God and with one another.

Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

Most merciful God, we confess that we are captive to sin and cannot free ourselves.


We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart;

we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ. By grace you have been saved. In the name of + Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven. Almighty God strengthen you with power through the Holy Spirit, that Christ may live in your hearts through faith. Amen.

READING: 1 CORINTHIANS 11:23-26

The only story from the life of Jesus that Paul recounts in detail is this report of the last supper. His words to the Christians at Corinth are reflected today in the liturgies of churches throughout the world.

For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, ²⁴and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." ²⁵In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." ²⁶For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

The reading is concluded: Word of God, word of life. Thanks be to God.



GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

The Holy Gospel according to John the 13th chapter Glory to you, O Lord.

GOSPEL: JOHN 13:1-17, 31B-35

The story of the last supper in John's gospel recalls a remarkable event not mentioned elsewhere. Jesus performs the duty of a slave, washing the feet of his disciples and urging them to do the same for each other.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now



what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" 'Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." 'For he



knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

¹²After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? ¹⁸You call me Teacher and Lord and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. "If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. "Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

As the psalm is read, the altar is stripped.


SILENT PRAYER
