

Matthew: Rest for Your Souls

Discussion Guide for Matthew 11:20-30 on Sep. 13th & 14th, 2025

Summary

In this passage, Jesus responds to the growing rejection of His ministry. The cities of Galilee saw His miracles and heard His teaching, yet they did not repent (vv. 20–24). Jesus warns that greater light rejected brings greater judgment. He then explains that spiritual truth is hidden from the proud but revealed to the humble—those who come like children (vv. 25–27). Finally, He offers one of the most beautiful invitations in Scripture: “Come to me, all who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest” (vv. 28–30). True rest doesn't come from religion, rule-keeping, or self-effort—it comes from taking Jesus' yoke, learning from Him, and letting Him carry the load with us.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, thank You for sending Jesus to give us rest for our souls. As we open Your Word, quiet our hearts, remove our pride, and make us childlike before You. Help us trade our heavy burdens for Christ's easy yoke. May this time draw us closer to You and to one another. In Jesus' name, amen.

Ice Breaker

When you're stressed or worn out, what's one thing you usually do to try and find rest?

Key Verses

1. Matthew 11:20–24
2. Matthew 11:25–27
3. Matthew 11:28–30

Questions

1. The Galilean towns saw Jesus' miracles but didn't repent. Where might we show indifference to God's work in our own lives?
2. Why does Jesus say it will be “more tolerable” for places like Sodom than for towns that saw Him and refused to believe? What does that teach us about responsibility with what we've been given?
3. Why does Jesus say God reveals truth to “little children”? What does childlike faith look like for you right now?
4. In v. 27, Jesus claims only He can reveal the Father. How does this challenge the idea that “all paths lead to God”?
5. What are some “yokes” people carry today—legalism, performance, expectations, anxiety? Which of these do you relate to most?
6. Jesus says “Come, Take, Learn.” Which of those steps is hardest for you—coming honestly, taking His leadership, or learning as His disciple? Why?
7. How does knowing you have eternal life (1 John 5:11–13) bring freedom and rest to your walk with Christ?

Life Application

This week, practice Jesus' invitation in Matthew 11:28–29:

- **Come:** Take 5 minutes each day to bring your specific burdens to Jesus in prayer.
- **Take:** Identify one heavy yoke (performance, control, others' expectations) and give it over to Him.
- **Learn:** Read one Gospel story about Jesus' heart. Ask: *"What do I learn about Him here, and how can I follow Him in this today?"*

Write down one burden you're trading and one step of obedience you're taking this week.
