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"The Night Will Soon Be Ending"

Night is often associated with evil and sinful happenings. It can also mean the present evil age, or a time of sleeplessness and frustration. Night can be marked by sin, suffering, futility, and death.

The first portion of verse 1 is the picture of an approaching dawn. This present age of darkness is passing away; light is dawning.

Romans 13:12 states: "The night is far gone; the day is at hand." This is a clear example of the New Testament teaching that the end time is near. Early Christians regarded the death and resurrection of Christ as crucial events that began the last days. Since the next great event in God's redemptive plan is the second coming of Jesus Christ, "the night," no matter how long chronologically it may last, is nearly over.

The hymn suggests that we can already start to rejoice because we know that Jesus will come again. This is so because Jesus, the Light of the World, has taken all of our sins with him to the cross. In Revelation 22:16, Jesus calls himself "the morning star." This image represents the brilliant glory of Christ.

Jesus has removed all our guilt and shame because he has reconciled us through his redemptive power. He remains with us during the dark times in our lives, in our illnesses, and even our deaths.

By grace Jesus has saved us, and by grace he will never forsake us. We are his dear children. Along with the apostle John in Revelation 22:20, we say, "Come, Lord Jesus!"
