Read Jeremiah 23:1-6:

- 1. Who are the shepherds that the Lord is rebuking in this passage?
- 2. How have these shepherds scattered the Lord's flock?
- 3. What do you make of the Lord's promised actions in this text?
- 4. Where do you see the Lord's fulfillment of these words?
- 5. What do the phrases, "righteous Branch" and "The Lord is our righteousness" bring to mind for you?

Read Mark 6:30-44:

- 1. From where had the disciples just returned?
- 2. How does Jesus' response to all their experiences strike you?
- 3. Sometimes moments for rest get interrupted, how does Jesus handle this interruption?
- 4. How would you react if you were in the disciples' shoes and Jesus asked you to feed this larger crowd?
- 5. What details about this miracle stand out to you the most and why?

Read Ephesians 2:11-22:

- 1. Paul speaks about the unity the Gospel brings for Gentiles and Jews, what stands out to you in the words that Paul uses?
- 2. How do verses 20-22 help us see that the Church is a building but not simply of bricks and mortar?

Devotional Thought:

When a multitude of Jesus' followers have far too little food for all to eat, Jesus multiplies five loaves and two fishes so that all are satisfied. When problems threaten us and needs overwhelm our resources, what is our reaction? Do we turn first to the Lord? We should, as His Word makes clear, for He still treats His flock with compassion and more than provides for every need of body and soul (Adapted from the Lutheran Study Bible, 1668).
