

- 2. Where else did Jesus share this same idea as in verse 44?
- 3. On what does verse 46 keep us focused?
- 4. How do verse 49-53 connect us back to previous readings?
- 5. Why is verse 50 a special connection for Emmanuel's sanctuary?

#### **Read Acts 1:1-11:**

- 1. What are two important details that get shared with us in verses 1-3?
- 2. What do you make of the disciples' question?
- 3. Who are the two men who talk with the disciples? Why do we assume this?
- 4. What is comforting about their words to the disciples?
- 5. Where else in the Bible might verse 11 point us?

#### Read Ephesians 1:15-23:

- 1. What is Paul's desire for the Ephesians (see verses 17-19)?
- 2. What proof is there of God's great might and power (see verse 20-21)?
- 3. How does the end of this passage help us see Christ's ascension as more than a change of location?

## **Devotional Thought:**

Jesus, truly risen in His body from the dead, reigns as unseen King over the here and now. He will return in full sight of all in the Father's good time. Therefore, do not let the evil one lock Jesus in the past or reduce His ministry to you now. Boldly pray to Jesus, and acknowledge Him as your Lord. Your good standing today and your eternal tomorrow flow from Jesus' victory over the grave and His enthronement at the Father's right hand. (TLSB, 1831)
