Read Isaiah 2:1-5

- 1. What is the significance of Judah and Jerusalem mentioned in verse one?
- 2. What is meant in verse two by "latter days"? See Hebrews 1:1-2.
- 3. Read Isaiah 11:9; 27:13; 56:7; 57:13; 60:3–5; 65:25 and 66:20. How are we to understand the prophecy about "the mountain of the Lord" being "established as the highest of the mountains" and hills in today's text?
- 4. Read God's promise to Abraham in Genesis 12:3. How does this pivotal Old Testament story connect to the words in Isaiah 2:2-3?
- 5. How is our text also related to the birth of the church as it is described in Acts 1:8 and 2?

- 6. What is the promise of God in verse four?
- 7. How is verse five explicitly Christ-centered (Christological)? See John 8:12.

Read Matthew 24:36-44

- 8. Today's text occurs in the middle of a long excursus in which Jesus predicts the destruction of the temple, His own crucifixion, and finally the end of time and coming of the Son of Man. What does Jesus say, "concerning that day and hour" in verse 36?
- 9. What important point is Jesus making by referencing the days of Noah?
- 10. Verses 41-42 are sometimes used as a proof-text for the "rapture" by those who hold a premillennial view of the end times. We don't hold to this teaching because it is at odds with other clear teachings on the end times. Read I Thessalonians 4:13-18 where the phrase "caught up" is used in verse 17 (in Latin this is translated "rapio"). What picture of the second coming does this text paint?
- 11. What point is Jesus making in Matthew 24:41-42?
- 12. Why are Jesus' words to the disciples in this text especially poignant at this time in His life? Why are they especially poignant at this time in your life?
