THE LITANY OF THANKSGIVING

The psalmist writes: “Let the redeemed of the LORD . . . thank the LORD for His steadfast love, for His wondrous works to the children of men” (Psalm 107:2a, 21).

Leader: We bless God for the peace that our nation has known on its shores for two and a half centuries. And we give our thanks for the generations of men and women who have lived devotedly and even died sacrificially to keep the freedoms that we enjoy and to maintain the peace that we know here in our land. As King David wrote in one of his psalms we pray: “You, O LORD, are a shield about me, my glory, and the lifter of my head” (Psalm 3:3).

Leader: We give glory to God for the United States that each of us knows, no matter what location in this vast country we call home. Confident of future blessings and with true thankfulness, we can echo the words of Psalm 126, which summed up the sentiment of God’s people: “The LORD has done great things for us; we are glad.”

THE FIRST READING: Zechariah 9:9-12

Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem! behold, your king is coming to you; righteous and having salvation is he, humble and mounted on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. ¹⁰I will cut off the chariot from Ephraim and the war horse from Jerusalem; and the battle bow shall be cut off, and he shall speak peace to the nations; his rule shall be from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth. ¹¹As for you also, because of the blood of my covenant with you, I will set your prisoners free from the waterless pit. ¹²Return to your stronghold, O prisoners of hope; today I declare that I will restore to you double.

We know that the law is spiritual, but I am of the flesh, sold under sin. ¹⁵I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. ¹⁶Now if I do what I do not want, I agree with the law, that it is good. ¹⁷So now it

is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells within me. ¹⁸For I know that nothing good dwells in me, that is, in my flesh. For I have the desire to do what is right, but not the ability to carry it out. ¹⁹For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I keep on doing. ²⁰Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells within me. ²¹So I find it to be a law that when I want to do right, evil lies close at hand. ²²For I delight in the law of God, in my inner being, ²³but I see in my members another law waging war against the law of my mind and making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. ²⁴Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death? ²⁵Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!

THE DISTRIBUTION OF HOLY COMMUNION (Served by stations)

When Jesus said, “This is My Body...This is My Blood,” He really meant it. As Lutherans, we believe in the real bodily presence of Christ in the Sacrament, not merely in a figurative or symbolic sense. This means that Jesus’ body and blood are actually present in the bread and wine received in Holy Communion. In this meal our faith is strengthened and forgiveness is assured. This gift is an act of God’s love, which we don’t deserve, cannot explain, and don’t even fully understand. We humbly believe it. It is a request of our congregation that anyone who wishes to commune with us would share this faith. If you are not receiving the Lord’s Supper today but desire a blessing, approach the Pastor with your arms crossed over your heart. The individual cups located in the center of each tray contain non-alcoholic wine for those having that medical need. Individually packaged gluten-free communion wafers are available. Please ask the Communion Assistant if you have this dietary need.

Missionary Heidi Wilkinson to Give Ministry Minute this Weekend - Emmanuel member and missionary to Ethiopia, Heidi Wilkinson, will address the congregation in each service this weekend. She will also be available to talk about her experience in Addis Ababa last year following each service.

Reformation Treasures Return to Emmanuel - Rare Reformation-era books donated by a lifelong Emmanuel family are returning to the city from a major university collection. The donated books and other historically significant books that influenced and reflected the Protestant Reformation will be on exhibit at Emmanuel before returning to the Kessler Collection housed in the Pitts Theology Library at Emory University in Atlanta on July 25 and 26 in Ebenezer Hall. The theme of the exhibit is “From Latin to the People: Reforming Worship in 16th-Century Germany.” Dr. Richard “Bo” Manly Adams, Director of the Pitts Library, and Dr. Armin Siedlecki, Head of Rare Book Cataloging, have organized the exhibit and will be giving a multimedia lecture with that title at 2:00 p.m. in Emmanuel’s sanctuary. Around that theme, the exhibit

will include 16th-century catechisms, period Bibles, a 1526 printing of Luther's Deutsche Messe, and earlier tracts influencing Luther's Order of Service, including the Lord's Supper. Also on display will be historic records of Emmanuel Lutheran Church, and historical photos and artifacts of the Dornseif family, who brought the books to America as German immigrants in the mid-1800s and who eventually settled in Fort Wayne. Members of the extended Dornseif family have attended Emmanuel for four generations. The exhibit will be open to the public on July 25, from 10:00 a.m. -4:00 p.m.

Emmanuel's LWM/LWML – Our next meeting will be on Thursday, July 9 from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. in Lower Level Ebenezer. Our special guest speaker will be Heidi Wilkinson. She will give us highlights from her past year's ministry in Ethiopia!

Lutherans for Life will meet on Friday July 10, at 9:30 a.m. Our guest speaker is Toni Lovell Director of Clinical Services. She will speak on senior addiction, highlighting why older adults are uniquely vulnerable to developing substance use disorders. It explores how life transitions such as retirement, grief, social isolation, chronic health conditions and increased medication use can contribute to addiction risk.
