KEY SCRIPTURE: Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." (Matthew 22:27-30)

OVERVIEW: Here's what Jesus said matters most: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart...and love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:37-40). Truth is, loving our neighbors can seem like messy, unpredictable, time consuming and hard work. But what if Jesus really meant what He said? What if loving our neighbors is exactly what Jesus is calling us to do now? What if loving our neighbors in this season of pandemic, uncertainty, and divisiveness unleashed a wave of love, joy and peace in our hearts and our region? Maybe, for the very first time, we might even experience this deep abiding sense that we are actually doing what God has called you to do in our neighborhoods? And we will do it with hundreds of other singles and families all across our region.

The Knowing-Doing Gap. You have the information and the knowledge, but there is a gap between your knowing and your doing. You know what to do, you just don't actually do it.

This isn't just a widespread problem in the business world. It is also a significant issue in our own lives and in our churches. It is possible to gather a lot of information and knowledge about God, about Jesus, about the Bible, about the church even, but not actually put it into practice.

Jesus was extremely aware of this knowing-doing gap. One time, he said it quite bluntly:

"So why do you keep calling me 'Lord, Lord!' when you don't do what I say?

~ Luke 6:46

... love your neighbor as yourself...

~ Leviticus 19:18

The entire Scripture builds on this premise of Leviticus 19:18, it speaks of love as something we participate in, it speaks of love as a dominant characteristic of the community of God's people. It permeates their words, their thinking, their attitudes, their actions reflecting what is true in the community of our Trinitarian God.

Love God. Love people. It's that simple. And it's that hard.

"They do not keep for themselves the goods entrusted to them. They do not covet what belongs to others. They show love to their neighbors. ... They speak gently to those who oppress them, and in this way they make them their friends. It has become their passion to do good to their enemies. ... If anyone among them is poor or comes into want while they themselves have nothing to spare, they fast two or three days for him. In this way they can supply any poor man with the food he needs. This, O Emperor, is the rule of life of the Christians, and this is their manner of life."
