family **DEVOTION**

Consider following up with your student later in the week with the following summary and discussion questions.

SUMMARY: JOHN 18:28-40

The Jewish leaders led Jesus from one official to another, finally bringing Him to the headquarters of Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor of Judea. Pilate had questions for both them and for Jesus, and none of the answers seemed to satisfy him. This seemed like a matter of Jewish internal affairs, and he didn't want to get involved. He attempted to resolve the matter by giving the crowd a choice: he would release one prisoner to them of their choice. If he could pardon Jesus this way, the whole matter could be settled. However, the crowds told him to instead release Barabbas, a rebel who had been arrested for murder and theft.

discussion QUESTIONS



.01 Why would the crowds choose Barabbas, who was a revolutionary and potentially a political extremist, instead of Jesus?



.02 How can Jesus's experience help you when life feels uncertain or unfair? How can you pray at times like this?

PRAY: These can be difficult and painful passages to read. Pray that the Spirit would be with you and help you to learn God's truth through studying these chapters about Jesus's final days leading up to His death, and thank Him for what He is teaching you. ()
