Our God Who Is Light of the World

Opening Questions:

We use lights as a major component of how we decorate for the Christmas season.

What response do you have when you see the first holiday lights of the season?

What symbolic meaning do you associate with lights at Christmastime?

Teaching Notes:

In the beginning, there was light...

Genesis 1:1-4

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness.

The first lantern: A Pillar of Fire

Exodus 13:21-22

By day the Lord went ahead of them in a pillar of cloud to guide them on their way and by night in a pillar of fire to give them light, so that they could travel by day or night. Neither the pillar of cloud by day nor the pillar of fire by night left its place in front of the people.

The Second Lantern: A Covenant with David

2 Chronicles 21:7

Nevertheless, because of the covenant the Lord had made with David, the Lord was not willing to destroy the house of David. He had promised to maintain a lamp for him and his descendants forever.

The Third Lantern: Prophetic Promises

Isaiah 9:2

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned.

Isaiah 49:6

It is too small a thing for you to be my servant to restore the tribes of Jacob and bring back those of Israel I have kept. I will also make you a light for the Gentiles, that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth.

"I've Brought You The Moon..."

Luke 2: 29-32

Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all nations: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel.

John 1:1-5, 9

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world.

John 8:12

When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

Philippians 2:15
Then you will shine among them like stars in the sky.

Light for Eternity

Revelation 21:23

The city does not need the sun or the moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and the Lamb is its lamp.

Revelation 22:5

There will be no more night. They will not need the light of a lamp or the light of the sun, for the Lord God will give them light. And they will reign for ever and ever.

Discussion Questions

- 1. Knowing now how light is discussed in Scripture, how has your understanding of what it means to decorate with lights at Christmas developed or changed?
- 2. Why is it important that Jesus is the ultimate source of *both* salvation and guidance?
- 3. How does knowing that the Bible tells one coherent story with Jesus as the center influence how you approach the study of Scripture?
- 4. What does the analogy of Christians shining like stars in the sky mean for how we approach our everyday lives?
- 5. How is our ability to have hope and joy linked to the promise of eternal light found in Revelation?
