## Summary

In this powerful exploration of Revelation 13, we delve into the symbolic imagery of the beast, the false prophet, and the mark of the beast. We're reminded that the Antichrist will not appear as we might expect - he'll be deceptively appealing, offering false peace and miracles. This serves as a crucial reminder for us to cultivate discernment in our spiritual lives. The number 666 is unpacked not just as a literal mark, but as a representation of human self-sufficiency and restlessness apart from God. We're challenged to examine our own lives - are we truly finding rest in Christ, or are we caught in the cycle of worldly striving? The message urges us to stay vigilant, rooted in God's word, and to live out our faith authentically rather than merely professing it. In these uncertain times, we're called to be like the 144,000 - joyful, pure-hearted witnesses to God's truth, even in the midst of tribulation.

## **Key Points**

# **Small Group Guide**

### **Key Takeaways:**

- 1. The Antichrist will not initially appear to be against Christ, but will offer an alternative to Christ.
- 2. The mark of the beast (666) represents humanism and self-sufficiency apart from God.
- 3. The 144,000 likely represent faithful believers who remain pure and dedicated to God during tribulation.

#### **Discussion Questions:**

- 1. How can we develop discernment to recognize deception, especially regarding end times events?

- 3. What does it mean to be "marked" by God versus being "marked" by the beast? How does this impact our daily lives?

Devotional July 23, 2025

#### Day 1: Discernment in Deceptive Times Reading: 1 John 4:1-6

Devotional: In a world of increasing confusion and deception, God calls us to cultivate spiritual discernment. The Antichrist, as discussed in Revelation, will not appear obviously evil but will be deceptively appealing. This reminds us of the critical importance of testing every spirit and message against God's truth. Today, reflect on areas in your life where you may need greater discernment. Ask the Holy Spirit to sharpen your spiritual senses and deepen your understanding of God's Word, so you can recognize truth from falsehood in these challenging times.

### Day 2: The Mark of Faith Reading: Ephesians 1:13-14

Devotional: While the world may be marked by systems of control or allegiance to earthly powers, believers are sealed by the Holy Spirit. This divine mark is not visible, but it transforms our hearts, minds, and actions. Consider how your life reflects this heavenly seal. Does your behavior, speech, and thought life demonstrate allegiance to Christ? Pray for the Holy Spirit to work more deeply in you, aligning every aspect of your being with God's will and purpose.

#### Day 3: Joy in the Midst of Tribulation Reading: Philippians 4:4-7

Devotional: The 144,000 in Revelation sing a new song even in the midst of great tribulation. This powerful image reminds us that joy in the Lord is not dependent on circumstances but on our relationship with Him. Reflect on times when you've experienced unexpected joy in difficult situations. How can you cultivate a spirit of praise and thanksgiving, regardless of your current challenges? Ask God to fill you with His joy and peace that surpasses understanding.

### Day 4: Living Faith vs. Intellectual Belief Reading: James 2:14-26

Devotional: True Christianity is more than just correct doctrine; it's a transformed life. The young man in the sermon who struggled to reconcile his intellectual faith with genuine compassion reminds us that spiritual growth involves both knowledge and action. Examine your own faith journey. Are there areas where your beliefs haven't yet translated into changed behavior or deepened love for others? Pray for God to help you live out your faith in tangible, sacrificial ways.

#### Day 5: God's Sovereignty in Chaotic Times Reading: Romans 8:28-39

Devotional: The image of God's sovereignty as a picture frame, limiting even the actions of evil, offers great comfort in turbulent times. No matter how chaotic or threatening the world becomes, nothing can separate us from God's love or thwart His ultimate purposes. Reflect on areas in your life or in the world that feel out of control. Surrender these concerns to God, trusting in His overarching sovereignty. Ask for the faith to rest in His perfect love and unshakeable plan, even when you can't see or understand it fully.
