 Paul tells us that we have another Divine Intercessor. Jesus is our Intercessor in *heaven* (Romans 8:34, see above), the Spirit is our Intercessor in the *heart*:

"In the same way the Spirit also helps our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we should, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words; and He who searches the hearts knows what the mind of the Spirit is, because He intercedes for the saints according to the will of God."

-Romans 8:26, 27

Have you ever found yourself at a loss for how to pray? How does the Spirit's intercession both *help* and *protect* our prayers?

3. The passage we focused on in our teaching time (James 5:13–18) speaks to <u>our</u> role of intercession. The two qualifications that James identifies for effective intercession are *faith* and *righteousness*. Why are these so significant?

4. There was an occasion just prior to Israel's captivity when God told Jeremiah **NOT** to intercede for His people. What does this teach us about the limits of our intercession?

"As for you, do not pray for this people, and do not lift up cry or prayer for them, and do not intercede with Me; for I do not hear you."

—Jeremiah 7:16

5. We were reminded that there are <a href="three">three</a> "one anothers" in this portion of Scripture. The first one is negative ("don't complain or grumble against one another") and the second and third are positive ("confess your sins to one another and pray for one another)". Respond to the following statement:

"Most professing Christians do the first one quite *easily* and *frequently*, the second one quite *rarely* and *reluctantly*, and the third one quite *hastily* and *sporadically*."

Do you agree? If so, why?

What can we do in our LifeGroups to discourage the first one and encourage the latter two?
