

# Summary

## **Understanding God's Nature Through Creation**

The Pastor continued his series on the nature of God, emphasizing that despite God's transcendence, Romans 1:20 teaches that His nature can be understood through creation. He argued that the clearest reflection of God's nature is found in the creation of man, as stated in Genesis 1:27, where man is made in God's image. The Pastor encouraged attendees to explore previous messages on their website or app for a deeper understanding of these concepts.

## **God's Plurality, Diversity, and Unity**

The Pastor discussed the creation of man in Genesis 1:27, explaining that this verse reveals three essential qualities of God: plurality, diversity, and unity. He emphasized that any doctrine or theory about God must include these three characteristics, as they are fundamental to understanding God's nature. The Pastor also highlighted God's own testimony of His plural nature in Genesis 1:26, where God refers to Himself using the plural pronoun "us" when discussing the creation of man.

## **God's Equality and Submission**

The Pastor discussed the concept of God's plurality and diversity in the Bible, using Philippians 2:5-8 and 1 Corinthians 11:3 to explain that Jesus and the Father are equal in nature but not in role, with Jesus submitting to the Father. He emphasized that submission does not imply inequality and serves to define relationships, using military and family examples to illustrate this point. The Pastor concluded that without submission, relationships collapse as the rules governing them disappear.

## **God's Unity and Submission Sermon**

Pastor Bogan delivered a sermon on the nature of God, emphasizing the importance of diversity and unity within the Godhead and in human relationships. He explained how submission maintains order and productivity in relationships, using examples from the Bible and everyday life. Pastor Bogan encouraged the congregation to ask questions about the sermon's topics and promised to address

them in an evening session. He concluded with a prayer for understanding, strength, and unity among the congregation.
