PRAYER OF CONFESSION

PRAYER AROUND THE CROSS

During this time, as we sing the hymns of the passion, you are invited to pray in your pew, or you may come forward, whenever you feel moved to do so, to kneel at the rail to pray. Or you may come into the chancel to kneel around the cross. You may want to touch the cross, or even to rest your head upon it, as a way of thanking Jesus for what he has done for you or as a way of giving to him burdens that you are carrying, believing that "by his wounds, we are healed."

WORSHIP LITURGY

HUSTON-TILLOTSON UNIVERSITY MUSIC SCOLARSHIP

In worship we often sing songs and hymns of the Black Church. Songs of African descent are the parent of rock-n-roll, an American cultural phenomenon, and this music is among the building blocks of what is known today as American music.

This music, born in slavery and containing the rhythms, call and response of communities native to Africa began as a way of communicating messages of hope and perseverance, and even secretly communicating information about the underground railroad.

Today we share music from these traditions, including gospel and spiritual songs and hymns, to lift up this witness of hope, determination, inspiration, perseverance, and eternal life. We do so seeking to honor the style and context in which it originated and acknowledging that many of these songs have sustained the spirits of people of color as they endured pain that was inflicted or worsened by white churches.

Most songs from Black Church traditions were not published until after the names of their creators were long forgotten. In recognition of this, whenever we sing gospel and spiritual songs and hymns, we will begin the practice of contributing 'royalties' in an offering that will support the development of young Black musicians.

Currently, that offering will go to support the Gloria Quinlan Endowed Scholarship fund at Huston-Tillotson University. Huston-Tillotson University is a Historically Black Universities located right here in Austin and is affiliated with both the United Methodist Church and the United Church of Christ. Dr. Quinlan grew up in Houston and began sharing her musical gifts with churches there in her youth. Throughout her career Dr. Quinlan remained committed to the church and worked as the Minister of Music at Ebenezer Baptist.
