May 7, 2023 Genesis 12:9 – 13:4 There and Back Again

Main Idea

The normal pattern of Abram's life was marked by obedience to the LORD's word and worship. Scripture reveals him to have been a man of exemplary faith. But sometimes, even the faithful fail, and before us today is the record of such a season in Abram's life. At some point, for reasons unstated, he dropped his guard and succumbed to the temptation to walk not by faith in God, but according to his own sight. This resulted in a test for Abram – not to see how he would respond, for God already knew the answer. Abram would continue to struggle until God intervened. The purpose of the testing was to bring Abram's inner stumbling into plain view, thereby revealing to the Patriarch himself his need for a course correction. Abram's growing self-reliance was chipping away at his faith and wakening it. That had to stop.

The test arrived in the form of a famine that although dangerous from a human perspective, was no match for God's sovereign providence. Sadly, Abram failed miserably! He chose not to stand on God's promises to him, and instead to take matters into his own hands by seeking safety in Egypt. After being overtaken by a far worse calamity than the one from which he fled, God intervened and rescued Abram. At the end of the ordeal, Abram repented. God had shown him his need to always trust fully in Him. Upon arriving back from where he'd begun, Abram worshiped the LORD.
