Are we more concerned about the temporal *here* and now or with the eternal *there* and *then*?

What are the five words from today's sermon text that ought to bring Christians great comfort and much hope?

WHY is a future bodily resurrection metamorphosis absolutely necessary?

(1 Corinthians 15:50; 1 John 3:2-3)

Application: **Resurrection Hope and Gospel-Centered Encouragement**

For Further Reflection/Application: *Lord help us to be effectually doers of the Word!*

Are you more concerned with the temporal *here* and *now* or the eternal *there* and *then*?

Why are unbelievers often obsessed with physical health and one's appearance, and yet so negligent or nonchalant when it comes to matters of the soul/inner person and eternity future?

The lost world is often obsessed with fleeting (cosmetic) things, especially one's appearance. This partially explains the 8+ billion-dollar cosmetic surgery industry. Note the following Scriptures- Proverbs 31:30; 1 Sam. 16:7; Is. 40:1; Eccl. 3:20; 2 Cor. 4:16. 1 Pet. 3:3-4.

Talk about the practical, personal, and theological implications of these 5 words of truth: "We shall all be changed." What did the preacher mean when he said, "resurrection metamorphosis?"

Church prayer chains include many health concerns, people who are ailing with various sicknesses, and funeral announcements. What prayers requests within your church family have you heard about lately? Do you have any health-related prayer requests? Do any of your extended family/friends have any such prayer requests? How can we show care and concern?

If Christ redeemed our soul but did not also promise us to give us a (new) glorified body (tailor made for eternity), why would this be cause for concern? Think about it this way: One can have tons of money and live in a beautiful place with the "perfect" climate (where it is 70 and sunny everyday), but if they experience significant physical pain every day and have Alzheimer's, are they truly able to enjoy their best life now? We are not yet what we shall one day be (believer)! For all Christians, the best is yet to come! We are not "home" yet!

Read Rom. 8:18-30. Philippians 3:20-21. 1 Cor. 15:50-58. 2 Cor. 4:16-18; 5:1-4. 1 Jn 3:2-3.

How does Christ's bodily resurrection (1 Cor. 15:1-19), something that happened long ago, bring hope to beleaguered believers today? How should the promise of a future, perfect, (new and improved) glorified body impact the present, here and now? (see vv. 20-53). When reading the Holy Scriptures please remember that the past and future are intended to influence the present. Biblical history and biblical prophecy are very practical and quite important.

People need to know that there is a future resurrection unto eternal life and a future resurrection unto eternal destruction (John 5:28-29; Acts 17:30-34). Death is not the end. Hebrews 9:27; John 3:36; Revelation 20:11-15.

Try and harmonize what's taught in 1 Cor 15:35-53 with Matthew 24:31, 1 Thessalonians 4:16-17; and Revelation 20:4. Next, consult the related comments in the MacArthur Study Bible.

What were some of the practical applications that were mentioned during today's sermon? If you are a believer, how do these Scriptural truths bring hope? How do they bring comfort and peace and rest? What songs highlight the main points from today's sermon?
