In Revelation, we see things as they truly are

- o D-Day war is over, but the battle rages
- o The decisive battle won by Jesus on the cross
- o Gen 3:15 Head of the serpent crushed through the death of the seed of the woman
- o Church in the middle of the battle

Revelation - Three Literary Genres

1. Apocalyptic

- o Flourished from approximately 200BC-100AD
- o Transmission from a heavenly being to a human
- o Rev 4-21 most of the book of Revelation falls into this category
- Highly symbolic not mysterious to the original readers
- o Encouragement to oppressed people

2. Letter

- o From someone to someone; reason for writing; Revelation has a purpose
- o Rev 1-3, 22
- o Easiest part of Revelation to understand and the part we are most familiar with

3. Prophecy

- o John in the tradition of the OT prophets
- o Prophecy words of comfort, challenge and hope

Four Primary Approaches to Revelation

1. Preterist

- o Fulfillment in the 1st century
- o Symbols refer to Rome (Babylon, best, harlot, etc.)

2. Futurist

- o Tribulation map
- o Rev 1-3 applicable in 1st century; Rev 4-22 about tribulation and the 2nd coming
- o Timeline for Daniel's 70th week

3. Idealist/Spiritual

- o Great drama depicting spiritual realities
- o Battle between God and Satan using symbolic language

4. Historicist

- o Represents all of church history
- o Fulfillment of prophecies throughout church history
