



Use this guide to help your community group engage further with this week's sermon.

Warning: Don't Reject Jesus! (Hebrews 10:26-31)

January 18, 2026

Read Hebrews 10:26-31 and discuss these categories and questions. (Please note that the time suggestions are based on 60-90 minutes of discussion time.)

1. **Orient yourselves to the Word** (5-10 minutes):
 - What stood out to you from this passage or sermon?
 - What tension, promise, or question does the passage surface for you?
 2. **Understand what Word is saying** (10-15 minutes):
 - What kind of sin is being addressed here? How is it described?
 - What does the author say is at stake for someone who continues in this posture?
 - What do we learn about God's character from vv. 30-31?
 3. **Let the Word engage your heart** (15-20 minutes):
 - Why do you think God chooses to warn His people so strongly in this passage instead of remaining silent? What does that suggest about His heart toward us?
 - Where do you see the temptation to drift, grow indifferent, or take grace lightly in your own heart? How can a warning from God serve a good purpose in that temptation?
 - How do you feel after reading this passage: fearful, resistant, comforted, motivated, or something else? Why?
 4. **Consider how the Spirit uses the Word to produce faithful obedience** (10-15 minutes):
 - What would it look like to receive this warning as an expression of God's care rather than a threat hanging over you?
 - What practices or relationships help you keep trusting Christ rather than slowly drifting away?
 - If God is using this passage to awaken or expose something in your heart, what is one faithful response He might be inviting you into this week?
- Pray for one another according to this passage** (20-30 minutes):
- How would you like us to pray for you in light of this conversation?
 - Ask God to keep your hearts soft, responsive, and anchored in Christ.
 - Pray for perseverance in faith for one another or those who may be drifting.
 - Thank God that, in Christ, we can draw near with confidence rather than terror.
