



Use this guide to help your community group engage further with this week's sermon.

By Faith Jericho and Rahab (Hebrews 11:30-31)

June 14, 2026

Read Hebrews 11:30-31 and discuss these questions:

1. What stood out to you in this passage and sermon, and why?
2. What specific words or phrases in this passage show you how faith is active (not passive) in both the fall of Jericho and Rahab's rescue? How do these details shape your understanding of what biblical faith actually is?
3. Why do you think God chose such an "unreasonable" strategy for Jericho and such an "unlikely" person like Rahab to describe faith in this chapter? What does that reveal about God's wisdom and His grace toward sinners?
4. Rahab moves from being an outsider under God's judgment to being welcomed into God's people. Where do you see that same pattern of outsiders and enemies brought into God's family by grace? Who in your life seems too far from and undeserving of God's grace? How does this pattern of redemption encourage you to pray for them this week?
5. When have you faced (or where are you facing) an immovable wall like Jericho, an area where God's commands or timing seem unreasonable? Why can it be so tempting to quit or compromise in those moments? What did (or what would) persevering in faith look like in that situation?
6. What is the difference between these statements: "my past explains me" versus "my past defines me"? How does Rahab's story challenge the way you view your own past or the past of others in our church?

Pray for one another. How would you like us to pray for you? Consider these:

- For faith to obey God in situations that seem impossible, unreasonable, or slow
- For faith to receive and live in the identity-changing grace of Jesus Christ

Consider reading Psalm 23 together as you close in prayer.
