## The Best Chapter in the Bible #7

Romans 8:18-25 Derek Thomas

## **Questions:**

- 1. "We live in a world full of suffering." How is that statement being realized in this world in the last week? If you embrace a theology of a suffering world does that seem pessimistic? Why?
- 2. Is the suffering in your life a result of your sin or is it just the way things are in this world?
- 3. Thomas says, "Yes, I <u>see</u> what happens all around me, I <u>feel</u> the frustrations of all that occurs around me and in me, but I 'reckon', I 'consider', I take a Christian worldview." How does that help?
- 4. What is the significance of the phrase in v.20 "but because of Him who subjected it"?
- 5. Referring to all the pain and suffering that exists in creation, Derek Thomas says this, "*These are not death pangs, but birth pangs.*" Is that your perspective? How would you add to or revise that statement? Is that your first thought when you suffer? Why?
- 6. Calvin is quoted "God has so ordered the Church from the very beginning, that death is the way to life and the cross the way to victory." How does that apply to every believer? Is this the common perspective of the typical believer (if there is a typical believer)?
- 7. Thomas says that although he cannot prove it, he believes that "More is gained in Christ than was lost in Adam." What do you think?
- 8. <sup>18</sup> For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. When Paul refers to "glory," how would you define it?
- 9. 1 Corinthians 2:9 Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, neither has it entered into the hearts of men what God has prepared for those that love Him.
