P: Come, you who are weary, you who have been bruised by life, you whose flame has flickered in the winds of the world.

P: The Holy One who stretches out the heavens is stretching us now—stretching our hearts toward courage, our hands toward compassion, our lives toward justice.

C: **We open ourselves to be stretched into new life.**

P: A voice from heaven says to us, as it said to Jesus: You are my beloved. This Spirit rests upon us, too.

C: **We are God's Beloved, called to be a part of God's justice.**

P: Come, let us remember who we are.

C: **Let us worship God with joy.**

Baptized In Water

Remembrance of Baptism

All may make the sign of the cross, the sign that is marked at baptism.

P: Blessed be the Holy Trinity, ☧ one God, the Source of Life and Breath of love.

C: **Amen.**

P: In this season of Epiphany, we remember that God's light is not hidden. It shines for all people, drawing us in, calling us by name, and meeting us where we are. At the font, we remember who we are and whose we are.

(Silence is kept for reflection.)

We give thanks for the gift of water—water that hovered over creation, water that set limits to chaos and carried a covenant of mercy, water that led people from bondage into freedom. In the river Jordan, you named Jesus as your beloved and sent your Spirit to rest upon him. In these same waters, you name us beloved too and claim us as your own.

C: We are God's beloved. All that we have and all that we are belongs to God.

P: In these life giving waters, you promise that death does not win, that love endures, and that new beginnings are always possible. This water reminds us that we are held, guided, and never abandoned.

C: God's light goes before us. God's Spirit is the light given to us, and the light we see in others.

P: People of God, remember your baptism. You were sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever—claimed in love, named for mercy, and sent for the sake of the world.

C: We remember our baptism. We trust the promise. We give thanks to God for all of it.

P: Let us pray. Holy God, shining light and flowing grace, renew us in your promise throughout this season. When the path ahead feels unclear, give us courage to take the next faithful step. When your light unsettles us, give us trust to follow where you lead. Send us out—beloved, claimed, and guided—ready to reflect your love in a world still learning how to see.

C: Amen.

Prayer of the Day

P: Almighty God, at the baptism of Jesus you proclaimed him your beloved Son and anointed him with the Holy Spirit. Make all who are baptized into Christ faithful to their calling to be your daughters and sons, and empower us all with your Spirit, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

WEEKLY DEVOTIONS

Theme of the Week: The Youthfulness of Jesus

Jesus redeemed the whole extent of our human lives, from birth to death. Nothing pertaining to our humanity is left untouched by Jesus' life-giving flesh. God be praised! Throughout His life Jesus offered up His obedience to God as our own. On the cross, He offered up His sufferings under the Law's punishments as our own. For Jesus' sake, God loves us as dear children, whether we are newly born or nearing the last moments of this life.

SUNDAY SCRIPTURE: Luke 2:41–52 “Learning Trust and Faithfulness”

In this story, the Holy Spirit invites us to trust in Jesus' faithful love toward God and neighbor. The world often treats faith as a choice between loving God or loving people. But in Jesus, these are never in conflict. When Mary and Joseph lost Jesus, he remained in his Father's house, listening and learning. In doing so, he lived out trust in God. When they found him, Jesus did not resist them, but returned home and honored their authority. In this way, Jesus shows us what faithful living looks like: devotion to God and care for others held together. Through baptism and faith, Jesus' faithfulness becomes ours. We are freed to trust God and to live patiently and lovingly with those placed in authority over us. Gracious God, help us trust in the righteousness of Christ as our life and salvation. Amen.

MONDAY SCRIPTURE: Psalm 13 “How Long?”

Bringing our sorrow before God is not a sign of weakness; it is an act of faith. We often hide our pain from others, fearing judgment or misunderstanding. Yet unspoken grief can weigh heavily on our hearts. At times it feels as though God is distant or silent. The psalmist gives us permission to speak honestly, naming grief, fear, and longing without pretending they do not exist. In prayer, we place our pain into the hands of the God who knows suffering from the inside, revealed in Jesus Christ. Remember the cross. Remember God's steadfast love made known through Christ's suffering and resurrection. God does not abandon us—in this we find our hope! “I will sing to the Lord, for the Lord has dealt generously with me.” Amen.

TUESDAY SCRIPTURE: Romans 12:1–5 “Living by God's Mercy”

Our old selves resist giving up control, seeking recognition and approval even at the expense of others. But God's mercy in Christ reshapes our lives. We are invited to offer ourselves as living sacrifices—not to earn God's love, but in response to the grace we have already received. In Christ, we learn humility, discovering our place within the body of Christ where each member belongs and is valued. We live this way not by our own strength, but by trusting the mercy of God revealed in Jesus, who humbled himself even to death on a cross. Holy God, by your mercy, shape our lives for service and love. Amen.

WEDNESDAY SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 61:1–3 “Good News for All”

Jesus regularly gathered with others to hear God’s Word and to worship. On this day in Nazareth, he read from the prophet Isaiah and boldly declared that the promise was being fulfilled in their hearing. Having been anointed by the Holy Spirit at his baptism, Jesus began his public ministry by proclaiming good news to the poor, release to the captives, and hope to the brokenhearted. In him, God’s promise of healing and renewal takes flesh. The year of the Lord’s favor has come! Loving God, open our hearts to receive your Word and follow your Son in faith. Amen.

THURSDAY SCRIPTURE: Mark 10:13–16 “Receiving the Kingdom Like a Child”

Jesus reminds us that God’s reign is received, not achieved. Children do not earn love; they trust that it is given. In the same way, faith rests not on our accomplishments, but on God’s grace. Jesus welcomes children, naming them as examples of trust and dependence. As baptized children of God, we live by that same trust, confident that God provides what we need for life and salvation. Gracious God, strengthen our faith to rely on you alone for every good gift. Amen.

FRIDAY SCRIPTURE: Ephesians 6:1–4 “Living Love in Daily Life”

Jesus lived faithfully within his family, honoring both God and those entrusted with his care. In Christ, we learn that love of God is made visible in love for others. Within households and communities, faith takes shape through patience, care, guidance, and mutual respect. All our callings—to love, serve, and nurture one another—are lived out in Christ. Faithful God, thank you for the gift of family in all its forms. Help us live in love, grounded in you. Amen.

SATURDAY SCRIPTURE: Psalm 86 “Held by God’s Mercy”

When we cry out to God, especially in moments of deep need, we discover again that God is gracious and compassionate. No failure, shame, or guilt can separate us from the love made known in Jesus Christ. Through the cross, God’s mercy has already claimed us. Even when life feels overwhelming, we trust that God hears our prayers and responds with steadfast love. Nothing brings God greater joy than to restore and comfort those who turn to God in hope. You, O Lord, have helped and comforted me. Amen.
