

## XVIII.II. JONATHAN EDWARDS: RESOLVED TO LIVE FOR THE GLORY OF GOD ONLY - The Eighteenth Century (pt.2)

Two questions and answers:

### QUESTION 1. What is Church History?

**ANSWER.** Church history is the story of how Jesus has built his church for his own glory and his peoples' good. **Matthew 16:18** "I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

### QUESTION 2. Why should we study Church History?

**ANSWER.** We should learn church history because it is the amazing story of Jesus conquering the nations through his Gospel. **Revelation 6:2** "[Christ] came out conquering, and to conquer."

What happened in the Eighteenth Century (1,700-1,800) that shows us how Christ built His church as He continued to conquer the nations?

## **I. JONATHAN EDWARDS (1703-1758).**

**Everyone say, "Jonathan Edwards."**

*In the Eighteenth Century, God used Jonathan Edwards to teach and model many great things for the glory of Christ and the edification of the Church.*

### **HISTORY**

- **(i) Jonathan Edwards was born October 5th, 1703**, in East Windsor, Connecticut, a colony shaped by Puritan roots, where his father, Timothy Edwards, served as a pastor amid a community striving to maintain its covenantal faith against a shifting cultural landscape.
- **(ii) Jonathan Edwards' parents, Timothy and Esther (daughter of Solomon Stoddard), raised him in a home steeped in Puritan holiness**, providing a rigorous education in Latin, Greek, and Hebrew, alongside a deep reverence for God's Word.
- **(iii) Edwards showed an early fascination with both the natural world and spiritual matters, writing essays like "Of Insects" at age 11**, while wrestling with the sovereignty of God, a doctrine he initially found troubling but later embraced with joy. *\*APPARENTLY JONATHAN EDWARDS LOVED SPIDERS AND THEIR WEBS. HE WAS FASCINATED BY GOD'S DESIGN SEEN IN THEM.*
- **(iv) At age 13, in 1716, Jonathan Edwards went at Yale College** in New Haven, a center of learning influenced by Puritan thought, where he encountered the works of John Locke and Isaac Newton, shaping his intellectual and theological outlook.

- **(v) Edwards graduated with a Bachelor's degree in 1720**, then pursued theological studies, earning his Master's degree in 1723, preparing him for a life of ministry and scholarship.
- **(vi) In 1721, at age 17, Edwards came to a profound saving faith**, meditating on 1 Timothy 1:17, writing,
  - “There came into my soul... a sense of the glory of the Divine Being; a new sense, quite different from anything I ever experienced before... I thought with myself, how excellent a Being that was, and how happy I should be, if I might enjoy that God” **(The Works of Jonathan Edwards, Vol. 16, p. 792).**
- **(vii) Edwards briefly pastored a Presbyterian church in New York in 1722-23**, displaying maturity beyond his years, though he soon returned to Yale as a tutor from 1724-1726, refining his calling amid academic rigor.
- **(viii) In 1727, Edwards joined his grandfather Solomon Stoddard as assistant pastor in Northampton, Massachusetts**; that same year, he married Sarah Pierrepont, whose deep piety and grace complemented his ministry, forming a union that bore 11 children.
- **(ix) Edwards initially struggled with pride in his intellectual gifts**, but God humbled him, leading him to embrace a simpler, Christ-centered preaching style, trusting the Spirit's power over human eloquence.
- **(x) In 1734-1735, Edwards' preaching sparked a revival in Northampton**, detailed in *A Faithful Narrative of the Surprising Work of God*, as he called sinners to repentance and faith, igniting the First Great Awakening alongside George Whitefield.
  - “The Spirit of God began extraordinarily to set in, and wonderfully to work amongst us... There was scarcely a single person in the town, old or young, left unconcerned about the great things of the eternal world” **(A Faithful Narrative, p. 13).**
- **(xi) On July 8, 1741**, Edwards preached his famous sermon *Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God* in Enfield, Connecticut, where listeners trembled under the weight of God's wrath and grace, cementing his role as a revivalist.
  - “The God that holds you over the pit of hell, much as one holds a spider... abhors you, and is dreadfully provoked... it is nothing but his hand that holds you from falling into the fire every moment” **(Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God, p. 15).**
  - **DAVID BRAINERD CAME TO JONATHAN EDWARDS' HOUSE IN 1747. EDWARDS LATER TOOK BRAINERD'S JOURNAL, EDITED IT, AND PUBLISHED IT AS THE FIRST MISSIONARY BIOGRAPHY EVER PRODUCED. \*BRAINERD DIED WHEN HE WAS ONLY 29.**

- (xii) Edwards faced opposition in Northampton over his strict stance on **The Lord's Supper**, limiting it to professing believers, leading to his dismissal in 1750 after 23 years of ministry, a painful yet pivotal moment.
- (xiii) From 1751-1757, Edwards served as a missionary to Native Americans in Stockbridge, Massachusetts, where he wrote masterpieces like *Freedom of the Will* and *The End for Which God Created the World*, advancing Calvinist theology.
- (xiv) In 1758, Edwards became president of the College of New Jersey (later Princeton), but died shortly after on March 22, 1758, from a smallpox inoculation, leaving a legacy of theological depth and revival fervor. *\*EDWARDS DIED WHEN HE WAS ONLY 54*
- (xv) Edwards loved to study, often rising at 4am to spend 13 hours a day with books, penning works that blended reason and affection, yet he prized God's glory above all.
  - *EDWARDS APPARENTLY LOVED CHOCOLATE, AND WOULD ASK TRAVELERS GOING TO BOSTON TO BRING SOME BACK.*
- (xvi) More than anything, Jonathan Edwards loved the Triune God, writing,
  - "The happiness of the creature consists in rejoicing in God, by which also God is magnified and exalted" (*The End for Which God Created the World*, p. 432), a passion that defined his life and death.

## THEOLOGY

### I) Jonathan Edwards taught that **God created all things for His glory.**

- **Everyone say, "God created all things for His glory."**
  - *WORK: The End for Which God Created the World.*
    - **Psalm 19:1** "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork."

### II) Jonathan Edwards taught that **Sinners deserve the wrath of God.**

- **Everyone say, "Sinners deserve the wrath of God."**

- *WORK: Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God.*
  - **Deuteronomy 32:35** "To me belongeth vengeance and recompence; their foot shall slide in due time: for the day of their calamity is at hand, and the things that shall come upon them make haste."
    - **JONATHAN EDWARDS:** "The bow of God's wrath is bent, and the arrow made ready on the string, and justice bends the arrow at your heart, and strains the bow, and it is nothing but the mere pleasure of God, and that of an angry God, without any promise or obligation at all, that keeps the arrow one moment from being made drunk with your blood." — **Jonathan Edwards, *Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God, The Works of Jonathan Edwards, Volume 22, pg. 410.***

### III) Jonathan Edwards taught that **Christ is excellent.**

- **Everyone say, "Christ is excellent."**
  - *WORK: The Excellency of Christ.*
    - **Colossians 1:15-20** "15 He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. 16 For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through him and for him. 17 And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together. 18 And he is the head of the body, the church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in everything he might be preeminent. 19 For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, 20 and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross."
      - **JONATHAN EDWARDS:** "Christ, as he is God, is infinitely great and high, above all comprehension; and yet, as he is man, he is meek and lowly of heart, and invites us to come unto him with boldness and confidence." —**Jonathan Edwards, *The Excellency of Christ, The Works of Jonathan Edwards, Volume 19, pg. 570.***

### IV) Jonathan Edwards taught that **Christ is victorious.**

- **Everyone say, "Christ is victorious."**
  - *WORK: A History of the Work of Redemption.*
