A Glimpse into our Food Pantry

I was hungry and you fed me, thirsty and you gave me a drink; I was a stranger and you received me in your homes, (Matthew 25:35 GNT)

Each person who comes to the food pantry at Christ Our Savior receives a large paper bag full of provisions. The items are selected with possible meal options in mind. With a loaf of bread, the jar of peanut butter and jar of jelly will make quite a few sandwiches. If they have access to a stovetop and oven, the egg noodles, can of tuna and can of cream soup will make a nice casserole. They can also make dinner with the spaghetti noodles and spaghetti sauce. We include two cans of cream soup and two cans of regular soup in each bag. We also fit in two cans of vegetables, a box of crackers and a box of breakfast cereal. It's nothing fancy, but it will provide meal options for several days.

On a busy Friday, we might hand out 18 to 20 bags of food. Consider how many groceries that equals: that's 40 cans of vegetables, and 80 cans of soup (cream and regular). While 20 boxes of cereal sitting on the shelf seems like a lot,

they're all gone by the end of a busy Friday morning. The jars of spaghetti sauce and boxes of noodles go fast, too. Each bag of groceries costs about \$30 to fill. Filling one bag is a simple task, but keeping 20 stocked and ready to go is more of an operation.

We are grateful for the opportunity we have to share our blessings with those in need. God has always provided for our needs, and has always kept our food pantry in stock so we can care for the needs of others. We praise him that we have this opportunity to feed the hungry—and we are grateful for you, the members of Christ Our Savior, who are God's hands and feet to keep our shelves stocked.

What About Reverence?



Reverence isn't a word you often hear these days. What is reverence? Most of us probably have a vague sort of idea in our heads, but how does it look in practice? Is it exemplified by monks chanting in a solemn Catholic cathedral? Or in a child's prayers, as they knee beside their bed?

The truth is, reverence isn't a word, a song, or a specific action. Reverence is an attitude, an attitude that says, "Over and above everything else going on around me, there is something that deserves my ultimate respect."

As we enter the sanctuary on a Sunday morning, we bring our everyday lives, including the worries, the to-do lists, the responsibilities, and the distractions, right in with us. It can be a challenge to remember that this place is set apart, it is God's house and we're offered the unique opportunity of showing reverence as we shuffle into a pew.

At Christ Our Savior, our staff members and many volunteers work to create an atmosphere that speaks of reverence. Our sanctuary should be a place where you are free to be still and set aside the noise, busyness, and distractions that are inherent in every day life.

Our altar guild team set out the paraments and flower arrangements, ushers keep the sanctuary orderly, acolytes light the candles, and congregation members play preservice music to uplift, encourage, and calm our hearts before worship. These acts are more than a show for the sake of pomp and circumstance; the point is to point us to Christ, and show reverence and respect for Him.

We are very grateful to everyone who helps in this effort. Many of you give your time and talents to beautify this space and create this opportunity. Thank you!

We have a large and diverse congregation, and we enjoy seeing people in all walks of life come to Sunday services. Whether you're sitting in the pew managing your busy children, sitting alone, catching up with a friend you haven't seen for a while, gulping down coffee and struggling to wake up, or sliding into a pew during the opening hymn, there is an opportunity for you to remember who you are and who God is. Think about how you can show reverence.

However you choose to use this time, be respectful of those around you. Others might be praying, meditating on Scripture, or enjoying the beauty of the morning light coming in.

Let's take the gift we're offered and set aside the distractions flooding us and remember where we are. This is God's house, and we gather to worship our Savior and remember again his tremendous love for us. This is His space. God is there with us.

What to do in case of a

Heart Attack

A gentle man collapses at a gym in Austin, Texas. Two marathon runners have cardiac arrests in California. A young man collapses playing basketball. A woman has chest pain after shoveling snow. Damar Hamlin of the Buffalo Bills and a teen playing lacrosse have cardiac arrests from unexpected chest hits.


Cardiac arrest can happen to anyone, young and old, male or female but survival depends on quick response of cardio pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and use of an automated external defibrillator (AED) to help the heart to establish an effective rhythm.

Hearts attacks don't always occur suddenly. There are often warning signs of a problem, such as a discomfort in the chest that lasts more than a few minutes or goes away and comes back; a fullness or squeezing in the chest, like an elephant is sitting on your chest; pain in one or both arms, back, neck, jaw, or stomach. Women often present differently, with shortness of breath, cold sweats, nausea or lightheadedness.

So, what do you do? Minutes matter, don't delay. Call 911.

Did you know that COS has two AEDs? One by the ECP and one off the narthex and a number of elders have been trained in how to use them.

The AHA and Red Cross are great resources for information and videos on how to perform CPR.



As with most health issues, prevention is the best medicine. Maintain a healthy life style with regular doctor visits, exercise, balanced diet, stop smoking, moderate alcohol intake and sleep.

A short discussion on stroke goes hand in hand with the above message. In this case, time is brain, but there are not always warning signs. Symptoms most often seen are facial drooping (can't smile evenly), unequal arm movements, and speech difficulties. Call 911, do not drive the person to he hospital and do not give them aspirin. More often strokes do not kill but leave the person with possibly long standing physical and mental disabilities.

With either cardiac situation, everyone is different, but the key is rapid intervention. A healthy lifestyle and positive outlook help too!

2022 Budget Surplus Disbursements

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Through your generosity, we were blessed to have a budget surplus of \$35,986 in 2022. When we combine that with the remaining surplus funds from 2021, we had a total of \$54,386 in surplus funds. As is our tradition and our calling, we set out to give those funds to various ministries both locally and around the world.

Why do we have such a surplus? That's a testament to how well our staff is able to maximize your tithings. We set an annual budget based on our best estimates of cost. Then Pastor Davenport and especially the Thursday Repair Team, work very hard to keep costs down. Often, they are able to find ways to come in under budget. We are truly blessed by their efforts. And because we are blessed, we look to be a blessing to others.

Our staff worked together with the Church Council to see where we might utilize our surplus to help other ministries. Here are some of the highlights:

- ⇒ Our own Early Childhood Center will receive funds to update the cabinets and counter tops in their classrooms.
- ⇒ Several schools will receive donations, including: Concordia Lutheran School, Lutheran High Westland, St. Matthew Lutheran School, and St. Michael Lutheran School.
- ⇒ We earmarked funds to support our Livonia First Responders

- ⇒ As we all know, defending life has become even more important than ever, so AAA Pregnancy Resource Center and the Luke Clinic will be receiving funds from us.
- ⇒ Family of God will see a donation above and beyond what we normally budget so that they can continue God's work in Southeast Detroit.
- ⇒ Additional funds were given to the Synod National Offering for 2023. This offering is being collected leading up to the 2023 LCMS convention in Milwaukee. The purpose and goal of this offering is to produce meaningful Lutheran resources in other languages so that all may read, hear and speak the Good News of Christ crucified.
- ⇒ Finally, COFA and MOST are two programs where we reach beyond our boarders and spread the love of Christ around the world. They will both receive a donation.

It is a privilege to be able to share our blessing with others as we are called to do. If you have any questions about our budget surplus distributions, feel free to speak to any member of council or to Pastor Davenport.




