




Life Issues




- starting point: God's purpose for mankind
  - Genesis 1:28: "fill the earth and subdue it"
  - Deuteronomy 6:5: "love the Lord your God..."
  - Leviticus 19:18: "love your neighbor as yourself"
  - Micah 6:8: "to do justice, and to love kindness..."
  - 1 Timothy 3:1: "desires all people to be saved"
  - Matthew 28:19: "disciple all nations"



- starting point: God's priority for mankind
  - temporal life or eternal life?
    - The Gospel is not that Jesus died so that your temporal life could be good!
    - The Gospel is that Jesus died to pay for your sins so that by faith you will be saved and have eternal life!
    - Matthew 6:25-34



- the family
  - All government and authority in society flows from the role and authority of parents over their children.
  - The purpose of families is not only to bear children and contribute to society but to rear godly children.




- So what does this mean for...
  - healthcare
    - universal right (at all costs)?
      - untenable: not enough resources, knowledge, etc.;
         someone has to decide who lives and dies
    - Physical death does not equal spiritual damnation, but we often treat them the same.
    - How can we as disciples of Jesus serve in this arena?




- starting point: death, mankind, & God
  - Genesis 2:17: "...in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die."
  - Romans 5:12 (ff.): "...death through sin..."
  - 1 Corinthians 15:20-26: "...in Christ shall all be made alive. ... The last enemy to be destroyed is death."
  - Revelation 20:14: "Then Death and Hades were thrown into the lake of fire..."
  - Exodus 20:13: "You shall not murder."






- Q&A
  - Why is there death? sin
  - Whom do we fear, love, and trust during life and at our death? God
  - Who is in charge of life and death? God
  - Is everyone who dies condemned eternally? no!
  - Is everyone who dies saved eternally? no!



- Q&A
  - Should Christians fear death? no
  - Does that mean dying is good? no
  - Do we have to welcome dying? no
  - May we welcome death? yes, as long as that doesn't mean causing it intentionally




- So what does this mean for...
  - euthanasia
    - a.k.a. dying with dignity
    - = "good death" (a total misnomer)
    - = murder; taking death into our own hands without God's permission
    - It might *feel* compassionate but it is contrary to God's will, so we trust and obey him.




- So what does this mean for...
  - terminal diagnosis
    - general rule (?): We work to sustain life while recognizing that this is not always possible (humanly speaking).
    - As God's children by faith, we can be confident of what comes next and trust both our living and our dying to him.




- So what does this mean for...
  - terminal diagnosis
    - I'm not certain "quality of life" is the final factor.
    - We pray for discernment and peace.
    - Our witness in our death is just as important as our witness throughout our life.



- separation of body/soul
  - not measurable but recognizable (?)
  - not necessarily same as not breathing, no heartbeat, no brain activity (?)
  - We should tread lightly and respectfully.



- blessed death
  - Psalm 116:15: "Precious in the sight of the LORD is the death of his saints."
  - Revelation 14:13: "... Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord ..."



- required
  - humility before God
  - repentance
    - Death is the ultimate "reminder" of our sinfulness.
  - trust
