# Can we PLEASE get moving?

I don't know how summer road trips work for you and your families, but mine tend to go something like this...

We had planned to leave by 9 AM, but, after a few snoozes of the alarm, we're already off to a rough start. Those last few items on the packing list turn out to be harder to locate than I had thought, so I end up yelling questions across the house. Do you remember if we packed the sleeping bags?! I make coffee while we do breakfast with the kids and manage their ever-changing preferences. But you LOVE cheerios and blueberries. Why are you demanding yogurt instead? We finally pack up the car, and start rolling out the driveway at 9:45. Only 45 minutes late. Could be worse. Just as we merge onto the highway, Adele asks the important question: "You remembered to pack-up the toiletries after you brushed your teeth, right?" This frustrated prayer goes through my head at least once on the drive back home: Can we PLEASE get moving?

As the disciples first set out to work for Jesus' mission, they might've muttered this same frustrated prayer. After all, they had just witnessed the impossible! They saw their friend and teacher die on a cross and then rise from the dead! They saw him, talked with him, learned why this was all part of God's plan for salvation, and Jesus promised great things to them saying, "But you will receive power



when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth" (Acts 1:8). They were going to continue Jesus' ministry and tell the whole world! But, in the meantime, they had to wait. It was ten days of waiting after the Ascension until they saw the power of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. And, after that, they had more waiting and false-starts. They faced pushback and opposition to God's mission. They witnessed their friends and families thrown into jail and beaten for the sake

Rev. James and Deaconess Christel Neuendorf—Puerto Rico of their mission. We can have the assurance that our efforts are only done to support God's work of forgiving sins and redeeming the world. And, yes, we can even have the patience to trust that God is working in our every move and every step along the way.

It's God's mission and he invites us to be a part of it. It's my privilege as your pastor that I get to be a witness and supporter to what God is doing through each one of you.

# Where Children Learn Daily About Jesus

Christ Our Savior's Early Childhood Program Featured Ministry



This would normally be the time of the year when our COS Early Childhood Program (ECP) Director Laura Myers would be writing an "end of year" article in the Disciplegram. However, I practically begged her if I could write the article this time. Though I wasn't in the classroom daily, I was a regular witness to the excellent things that the Lord has done through the ECP at Christ Our Savior this past year.

As someone who has observed many congregations with Early Childhood Programs, I have to say that our ECP is truly something special. We have top notch teachers and staff who are incredibly loving to the children. Every child is bound to have some rough days, and I am a witness to how loving and patient our ECP staff is as they help each child work through the strong emotions that they are experiencing. The classroom environment is undoubtedly vibrant and fun!

One challenge that many churches with Early Childhood Programs face is that the ECP can easily become disconnected from the overall work of the church that established it. If the relationship isn't nurtured, Early Childhood programs can begin to act as a separate entity from a congregation and perhaps even lose focus from the mission they were created for. This is definitely not the case with our ECP program at COS! As I mentioned earlier, the children who attend our Early Childhood Program learn daily about Jesus. The love of Jesus Christ is reflected in everything from how children are disciplined to what they learn in the classroom. This often spills into the children's homes. We hear regularly from parents about how the children talk about Jesus with them at

This doesn't mean, however, that we shouldn't try to strengthen the connections between our



ECP and congregation even more. One intentional thing we did to "bridge" the Early Childhood Program with the rest of the congregation was to implement "Coffee Connections". Once a month, the church staff at COS greets parents of our early childhood students with a table full of breakfast snacks

and Tim Hortons coffee. This has given us an opportunity to get to know the parents better,

and it allows parents to familiarize themselves with those who interact with their children during chapels on Wednesdays.

Additionally, we held our Children's Christmas program during our advent service this year. Joining the ECP children and COS Sunday School children in worship not

only brought visibility of the ECP to the congregation, but allowed ECP families to see the church in worship as we celebrated the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ who is the reason for the season! We encourage you to join us for that celebration again in December.

So, how can we all at COS continue to support the work of our Early Childhood Program? First and foremost, please continue to pray for our ECP staff and all the children who come through our doors on a daily

basis. Pray that God continues to use His Word—which is shared with the children daily—to work in the hearts of the children and their families. Next, I'd encourage you to say "thank you" to any of our ECP staff as you see them. They work tirelessly to ensure the growth of our children.

Finally, to operate an Early Childhood Program in the state of Michigan, strict licensing guidelines and safety

standards must be followed. This means that the Early Childhood/Gym entrance is locked between 7 a.m. & 6 p.m, Mon-Fri. Parents and ECP staff are instructed not to let anyone they do not recognize through the entrance. This means that members needing to get to the gym/ kitchen area will need to use the main church entrance unless arrangements have been made with a ministry leader to allow them access. This also means that church members should refrain from opening the gym entrance door for anyone they do not know. Parents have access to the building with key cards. If approached by someone wishing to enter the building, please contact the director or a staff member to ensure that it is safe to let them in. To ensure a successful Early Childhood ministry, parents must trust that we are doing everything in our power to keep their children safe.

Thank you so much for your assistance and understanding. We are grateful for your support.


#### **Final Comments**

# Characteristics of Healthy Youth Ministry

A few years ago, the LCMS released a key report on what it means for a congregation to have a healthy ministry to youth. In this report, they summed up "7 Practices of Healthy Youth Ministry". I'll be using some of my upcoming Disciplegram articles to address these 7 practices. But instead of applying them solely to our ministry to young people, I think these practices will benefit ALL of us at COS regardless of our age.

The first practice is that healthy congregations are ones that have "warmth, challenge, and grace". Let's take a quick look at how these three terms are defined by the LCMS research.

#### Warmth

Warmth is defined as "...a welcome invitation to be with the family of God where we receive God's forgiveness and love, sharing it freely with others". It also involves people across generations knowing each other and wanting to get to know each other better. I think most of us see COS as a "warm" congregation. However, there are always ways that we can grow. How can we make COS even more of a warm, inviting place to be?

#### Challenge

"Challenge is being willing to engage in tough spiritual conversations. Standing firmly in God's Word, it faces the questions and confusion [we] experience living in our current culture."

Again, I feel we do this well at COS. But how can we continue to learn to not look down on anyone based on their age or where they are at in their faith, but to value them and walk with them as they grow in their walk with Christ? How can we continue to cultivate spaces—at church and in our homes—where everyone is comfortable sharing their questions and doubts about God? Maybe we don't want people to share their doubts with us because we don't think we'll have the answers that they are seeking. But we need to learn that it's perfectly

okay to say "I don't know the answer to that. I'm going to look into that and get back to you!". How can we remain steadfast in God's Word without forgetting to show LOVE to all whom we encounter (1 Cor.

13:1)? These are all things to think about when it comes to creating a challenging environment at COS.

#### Grace


"Grace in our relationships and culture echoes God's love and forgiveness to us. As youth struggle, grow and change, they need parents and supportive adults to constantly remind them of their chief identity as God's beloved Baptized child." Again, we all need grace. We do this together in corporate confession and absolution. We do this in our relationships with each other as we freely ask for forgiveness and freely receive it. How can COS continue to be a place of grace for each person?

Warmth, challenge, and grace. Do we truly welcome all to our COS family and incorporate them into our faith family (warmth)? Are we willing to have tough spiritual conversations with people, even if some of their questions make us uncomfortable (challenge)? Are we speaking God's love and forgiveness into people's lives (Grace)? Again, it's not just young people who need these things for their church... we all do! Let's continue to strive as individual members to reflect these Christ-like characteristics.

If you have any specific ideas on how we as a congregation can grow in these areas, I'd LOVE to have a conversation with you! Have a great rest of your summer!

# **Answering Your Questions**

Specific Ministry Pastor (SMP) applicant

Fritz Quitmeyer

And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest". Luke 10:2

In 2007 the SMP program was initiated by the LCMS in convention. It was established to develop pastors, through a different process than the traditional residential seminary, for specific ministries in congregations and other settings. The program is made up of online education and "intensives" at one of our seminaries. Once admitted to the program and studies begin the student serves as a vicar for two years. After his vicarage he is ordained as pastor and continues his education for another two years.

It wasn't too long ago that COS was being served by three fulltime pastors. When the Lord moved Fritz to consider the pastoral ministry our conversations began. It's clear to me that there is much for him to do, in a part time role, here at COS, in our community and in our circuit and District. Thanks be to God!

Here are some Q's and A's...

- What are the differences between an SMP and general ministry pastors (like pastors Davenport and Werner)? SMP's serve a congregation under direct supervision of a general ministry pastor. In this case Pastor Davenport. They are called to a specific ministry—in our case that of a staff pastor.
- Why is this position desired/needed? The proposed position description includes helping with senior and home bound care, teaching, preaching, community outreach through support groups and support for

circuit/District congregations. There is a need.

- Is this a full time or part time position? It is a part time position, 20 hours or less. Fritz will be able to serve in this position even after his 70<sup>th</sup> birthday. COS's policy allows for those that are 70 and older to serve part time.
- What are the Ministry Action Plan (MAP) considerations for 2024? There are no expenses for 2023. The MAP for 2025 has not yet been approved. It is estimated for 2025 that an
- amount not to exceed \$30K in expenses would cover a portion of the education and compensation involved. Benefits are not offered for part-time positions.
- When is the application deadline? August 1<sup>st</sup> is the deadline for the SMP application.

The Lord of the harvest is faithful! He supplies often times in ways that we don't anticipate. Please continue to keep our congregation and Fritz in prayers for this potential opportunity to minister and serve. Plan to attend the special meeting of the congregation on July 14<sup>th</sup> at 9:45am in the sanctuary. Your attendance is essential and appreciated to have a quorum for voting.

More detailed information will be made available before the Special Meeting. If you have more questions, comments or concerns, Pastor Davenport and Pastor Werner would be happy to talk to you about this move in our congregation. Also, feel free to bring your questions to the meeting on July 14!










Welcome Jill Reinert

The purpose of the workshop was to collect Missional Needs ideas that would support COS' Missional Living emphasis as depicted in the graphic to the right.

And collect we did...we ended up with 25 need areas identified that addressed needs here at COS, within the community here in Livonia and SE Michigan, and across the world. As a final exercise the group voted on which ideas they felt were "top of the list" for COS to consider addressing as a top priority. 


