

People of Hope—It's Time!

⁹The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance. ¹⁰For to this end we toil and strive, because we have our hope set on the living God, who is the Savior of all people, especially of those who believe. *1 Timothy 4:9-11*

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus the Christ! Our hope is in the living God, Jesus Christ! I know that you would agree with me—but how is that truth living out in your life?

We have surely been through a lot as of late. Don't hear me complaining but rather just hear me telling you the truth. We have seen our share of challenges over the past couple of years. The pandemic, the death of loved ones, the unrest in our country and the world, the divisions, and recently, financial challenges and burdens. None of us are immune. All of us have faced the obstacles. How have you faced them? What has been your foundation through it all? I pray it has been in the hope and confidence that we all have in the living God! Remember that we, because of Jesus, are people of hope! His love and faithfulness is the foundation that will never disappoint or fail. He is the hope that our lives are built on. We are people of hope!

As people of hope we are part of church body called the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS), a national body of Lutherans intent on sharing the message of salvation through Jesus. In our polity we conduct the "business" of the Church in national and local conventions. Our national Synod is broken up into districts (www.lcms.org/image/resources/LCMS-Region-District-Map.png) that are made up of congregations from several states or, in Michigan's case, all of the LCMS

congregations in Michigan (all of them except for the western UP). It's at conventions, where delegates elect officers, where resolutions (requests from the Districts or congregations) are brought forward to be discussed, adopted or rejected, where presentations are made while the commissioned, ordained and laity have opportunities for worship and fellowship. All of these gatherings are held on a triennial (3 year) rotation.

2022 is the year for our Michigan District convention, which will be held on the campus of Concordia University Ann Arbor, June 26-28, under the theme *People of Hope—It's Time!* Time for what? It's time to use all of who we are in sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ!


I want to make sure that all of you know that I have been nominated to serve as District President (DP) while also being nominated to serve as District Regional Vice President (VP), an office that I currently hold. There is a possibility that I will not be elected for either

position and there is a possibility that I will be elected for one of them. I cannot hold both positions. The DP election will happen right away on Monday morning (June 27) followed later in the day by the election for the Regional VP's (there are 4 regions in our District and 4 VP's). The DP is a call to serve as the "pastor of the pastors and congregations of our District" in a full-time capacity. Amy and I have already prayed through this nomination process and have said that I am willing to allow my name to stand. This means that if elected DP, knowing that God has used the process to "call" me to serve in that role, I would be accepting the position. In the same way, I am willing to serve as Regional VP if elected. The role of Regional VP allows the pastor to continue serving his present call and congregation while assuming responsibilities as VP. Again, this is something that I have been doing for the past 4 years.

Amy and I have always taken the position that the call that I am currently serving is my last call until the Lord shows that he has other plans in store for us. That's how we are handling this as well. I am not seeking, politicking, campaigning or running for either the DP or the VP position. Often I find myself running from them. I firmly believe that as a pastor you don't seek the call or the office, it seeks you. I don't know what the Lord has in store for us, our congregation or our District but it is my prayer, and I pray that it will be yours too, that He would put the right people in the right place at the right time to continue boldly proclaiming the truth of God's Word for the winning of souls. May God's will be done.

Remember that we are, in Christ, people of hope! The hope that we have been called to is a living hope in the living God and this is to be shared with all. Today is the day to acknowledge the blessings that He has given to us in Jesus while allowing us to be used by Him, wherever He calls us, for His glory.

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope. *Romans 15:13*

Sometimes I am surprised at how furiously people in our country will defend certain things. Some, it seems, would literally fight to the end to defend their right to own a gun. The Alternative Answers to Abortion Pregnancy Resource Center (AAAPRC) is a local, Christian, non-profit organization. They were founded in 1973 and have been helping women, men, and babies ever since! AAA is staffed by some of the most loving, caring, generous people I've ever known! They love the Lord and their passion is to save lives and strengthen families. Part of strengthening families means that they walk beside the parents from the time of a pregnancy test and/or ultrasound, through the birth, and for the first few years of the baby's life. Their many offerings for women and men include things like parenting classes, Bible studies, and counseling, even post-abortive counseling. They keep a stocked maternity closet and baby shop where moms can get things they need using tokens earned by attending classes and such. AAA is only funded through donations and all of their services are always free to their clients!

I have a heart for babies, for moms, and for life! My family and I have been volunteering at the AAAPRC for many years (around twelve, I believe). We basically help on an as needed basis and do whatever they need at that time. We've done a variety of things including counting the money from baby bottle drives, preparing bulk mailings to send to supporters and working at the annual fundraising banquets. Volunteering at the Center is truly a blessing because I get to know the staff and regular volunteers and I get a behind-the-scenes glimpse into the work they're doing to help and love people in need!

There are so many opportunities to support the AAAPRC! Here are some:

- COS holds a Baby Bottle Drive for them from Mother's Day to Father's Day. Pick up a baby bottle (or two) from the narthex on Mother's Day, fill it with change, cash, or a check, and bring it back on Father's Day. It's

that simple! You can also pick up a bottle after Mother's Day and return it before Father's Day. (Or later if you forget. :)

What Planned Parenthood's Amendment Could Do

Published February 8, 2022

On January 7, Planned Parenthood, the ACLU and others announced they are working on adding an unlimited abortion amendment to the Michigan Constitution. They hope to collect 425,059 signatures to put this amendment on the ballot in November.

Whether or not they are successful, it's vitally important for Michiganders to understand what this constitutional change would actually do to them.

Because the amendment is written so broadly, it's impact on Michigan laws could be profound and extend well beyond abortion. We are still completing a legal analysis of the amendment's potential effects, but simply read it and some possible effects should be clear.

Important Amendment Sections

- **Creates an unlimited right to anything related to pregnancy, including abortion:** *"An individual's right to reproductive freedom shall not be denied, burdened, nor infringed upon unless justified by a compelling state interest achieved by the least restrictive means."*
- **Defines a "compelling state interest" to mean any law has to both be related to the woman's health and can't infringe on a woman's decision in any way. If the law infringes on a woman's decision-making, it will be struck down:** *"A state interest is 'compelling' only if it is for the limited purpose of protecting the health of an individual seeking care, consistent with accepted clinical*

standards of practice and evidence-based medicine, and does not infringe on that individual's autonomous decision-making."

- **Claims to allow late-term abortion bans after "fetal viability" but creates a broad "mental health" exception that would allow every abortion to continue:** *"the state may regulate the provision of abortion care after fetal viability, provided that in no circumstance shall the state prohibit an abortion that, in the professional judgment of an attending health care professional[sic], is medically indicated to protect the life or physical or mental health of the pregnant individual."*
- **Redefines "fetal viability."** Instead of it meaning the point children can survive outside the womb—about 23 weeks—it would mean children that require significant medical care are not considered "viable," like for example every child in the NICU: *"the point in pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of an attending health care professional and based on the particular facts of the case, there is a significant likelihood of the fetus's sustained survival outside the uterus without the application of extraordinary medical measures."*
- **There's no limit to who can help women exercise these unlimited rights:** *"Nor shall the state penalize, prosecute, or otherwise take adverse action against someone for aiding or assisting a pregnant individual in exercising their right to reproductive freedom with their voluntary consent."*
- **The amendment does not specify whether "individual" includes minor children.**

Laws That Could Be Affected

When you combine those points together, it becomes clear that any state law or health regulation that addresses abortion or pregnancy in general is in danger. Anything that infringes on a decision made by a woman would be forbidden: not just for

abortion but anything related to pregnancy.

That means almost every law related to abortion could be gone if the amendment is successful. Here's only a partial list of state abortion laws that could be affected:

- ◇ Ban on tax-funded abortions
- ◇ Partial-Birth Abortion Ban
- ◇ Born Alive Infant Protection Act
- ◇ Parental consent requirement for children seeking abortions
- ◇ Waiting periods and informed consent requirements for women seeking abortions
- ◇ Health and safety regulations for abortion facilities
- ◇ Michigan's abortion ban (which was passed in 1846, slightly revised in 1931, and affirmed by Michigan voters in 1972)

Summary

Here is the summary of their amendment that appears on their petitions. If they collect enough signatures, this is also likely to be the summary that appears on voters' ballots in November:

Constitutional Amendment to: establish new individual right to reproductive freedom, including right to make and carry out all decisions about pregnancy, such as prenatal care, childbirth, postpartum care, contraception, sterilization, abortion, miscarriage management, and infertility; allow state to prohibit abortion after fetal viability unless needed to protect a patient's life or physical or mental health; forbid state discrimination in enforcement of this right; prohibit prosecution of an individual, or a person helping a pregnant individual, for exercising rights established by this amendment; and invalidate all state laws that conflict with this amendment.

Pro-Life In Action

Being the Hands and Feet of Christ

Being an advocate for life involves understanding God's stance on the sanctity of life and also being aware of politics and legislation that affect life issues. But there is more than just an intellectual battle; there are real faces and heartbeats involved. The Scriptures call us to be the hands and feet of Christ. One of the ministries our congregation supports is the Luke Clinic, which serves women and children in Detroit and Flint. They are proudly pro-life, and try to live that by practically meeting the needs of mothers and children. Their Annual Report gives an overview of how they serve:

The Luke Clinic celebrates five years of ministry and God's provision. We have been blessed to care for 611 patients, one-third of whom were babies and two-thirds were moms. We came to Detroit, wanting to make an impact on the infant mortality rate in the city. We believed that bringing free, accessible prenatal care would make a difference. We were right, but God had far greater plans for the Luke Clinic. Very quickly we realized the need to add in 12 months of free infant care. We also saw

that mothers were unlikely to prioritize their prenatal care if they were dealing with homelessness, interpersonal violence, food insecurity, and lack of access to reliable transportation.

Over the next five years, God has opened doors for us to provide a suite of wrap-around programs to meet these needs. Donor support has allowed us to offer Lyft rides to patients with no access to transportation, food and clothing supplies to families in need, and cover the cost of lab work and prescriptions for patients with no access to insurance. We try to provide all the services our patients need in one clinic. As a result of your giving, we have in-house lab services, a pharmacy, and ultrasounds for all patients....

...As a pro-life clinic, we are committed to empowering women and couples to address the pressures that leave them feeling like abortion is their only option. We try to come alongside them and provide support and resources that address their fears and concerns. Our goal

is to provide clients with complete and accurate information about prenatal development and abortion, to assist women in carrying their babies to term by providing emotional support and practical assistance while sharing God's love and plan for their lives, and to demonstrate integrity in dealing with clients, earning their trust, and providing information and services with the assurance of confidentiality.

In their April newsletter, the Luke Clinic introduced us to several of the faces that they care for and get to know. These lives are precious in God's eyes and they are the reason that the Luke Clinic, and other ministries like it, fight for life.



Introducing Jurzi

This little pumpkin goes by the name Jurzi - but she will always be known as Peppermint to us. Peppermint is her nickname and we love it! Pepper for short. Her Mom, Delanna, tells us that when she is hungry and not willing to wait for her bottle - she is more of a Peppermint than a Jurzi. We just get so much joy from seeing these precious bundles come to the clinic.

Our Man of the Moment - Leonard

Leonard is a hit with the ladies. He has everyone wrapped around his little finger. Youngest of six, Leonard is Jessica's fourth baby that she has delivered with The Luke Clinic. Leonard likes to hang with Wendy and Jen in reception, he can usually be seen welcoming everyone with a broad smile and he is usually dressed in a handsome little number his Mom has picked out for him...unless he is naked and cuddly like in this picture.



Last but not least - Tiffany Lilli

This little sweetheart has been a rock star. She was delivered at the University of Michigan Hospital. She comes home to be welcomed by her older brothers - one of whom is our resident helper at the clinic. Anderson is Pastor Scott's BFF. They work together and can be found coloring, playing Euchre, or helping set up or tear down the clinic. Tiffany will be loved, protected, and taken care of by her awesome brothers.


Spree Outreach is Back!

Giving Options

The staff at Christ Our Savior are consistently overwhelmed by the generosity of you, our members. We are thankful for your commitment and stewardship, seeking out ways to support the ministry and missions of Christ Our Savior while traditional “in person” worship and giving was not possible. As we find ourselves in a post-covid world, the methods of giving our tithes and offerings have also changed. We wanted to keep you informed of all the ways you can give, whether you join us for worship on Sunday morning or worship from home with the recorded services.

ELECTRONIC- via the *SUBSPLASH GIVING* link on the church’s website, members have the option of making contributions online, using their credit/debit card or ACH (bank account). These contributions can be set up as ‘one time only’ or recurring transactions. Those wishing to contribute to a Dedicated fund can select from the drop-down list or include a note in the memo of the form. Although convenient, the online giving incurs fees charged by SubSplash for processing. Members can elect to cover the processing fees incurred by their donations (an alternative to passing the cost to the church). Those interested in electronic giving should consider using their financial institution’s online bill pay option to avoid these fees. Especially if you are considering making large contributions, as fees assessed by *SubSplash Giving* are calculated based on a percentage of the dollar amount given.

ONLINE BILL PAY- it’s possible to make contributions through your financial institutions online bill pay. These transactions can be set up ‘one time only’ or recurring transactions. Please use your **FOUR DIGIT ENVELOPE NUMBER** as the **ACCOUNT NUMBER**. In general, financial institutions do not charge for using the **ONLINE BILL PAY** feature.


