Pastoral Epistle: *Continue the Delicate Discussions*

What delicate discussions do you engage in on a daily basis? Is what to have for supper a delicate discussion in your household? Are politics and faith in Jesus too delicate for the people in your sphere of life? What about the topics we're tackling this summer here at COS?

Many of you have engaged in our Sunday morning Delicate Discussions Bible study series this summer, and we have received a lot of supportive feedback regarding the topics and conversations we've been having. If you missed any of the sessions, most of them were recorded and are available on our website and app. They could even be used in your household or small group as conversation starters or studies.

One of our hopes with this series is to show that we do not need to shrink away from these delicate topics. In fact, we need to tackle these with all the love, compassion, and force of the Gospel as we are led by the Holy Spirit. As disciples of Jesus, we have the king of creation breathing life into us every day, and we are to breathe that same life into the world around us. We are to breathe it into our family members, our neighbors, our friends, and even the strangers around us. We are to disciple all nations—everyone. Continuing these delicate discussions is one way we can do that.

It might be uncomfortable at times. That's OK. (It's probably even good in ways.) It might be really confusing at times. That's OK, too. You might completely disagree with the people you're talking with. That's perfectly OK, too! Please let this sink in: there are going to be a lot of people enjoying eternal life with Jesus right beside you who disagreed with you in this life in a lot of things! It's not our position on LGBTQIA issues that saves us. It's our position in relation to Jesus! It's not our association with a political party that saves us. It's our association with God the Father as his beloved child!

So let's continue the delicate discussions long past our summer series. Let's continue to take the opportunities to share God's word but after we've spent twice as much time listening to other views first. Let's continue to share the Gospel and never forget that we were once on opposing sides with God. He took the first step and brought us near to him and granted us the faith to trust and love him. Let's show that same mercy as we continue the delicate discussions in our households, communities, schools, and neighborhoods so that all might see Jesus through us.



Life of Christ Wood Carving Pageant

Part 2

Seeing in a Different Light

If you remember from the May/June issue of the Disciplegram, we introduced the Life of Christ Wood Carving Pageant. This retelling of Christ's life through wood carvings was started by Karl Graupner, the great-grandfather of Ron Meyer and great-great-grandfather of Diane Sherman, both members of our congregation.

Later this year, this collection of over 300 pieces will be put on permanent display at Historic Trinity Lutheran Church in Detroit. This is the second in a series of articles introducing this collection to you, in anticipation of the display opening in November.

We hope that you will be intrigued and inspired by the workmanship and attention to detail that went into this collection, but also by the unique vision of Karl Graupner and the way his perspective can help us see the life of Christ in a different light.

You surely know the story of Palm Sunday. Jesus and his disciples enter Jerusalem while the crowds cheer them on waving palm branches and spreading coats. The celebration of Palm Sunday starts Holy Week and sets the stage for the somber events of the crucifixion and then the triumphant resurrection. As we celebrate this church holiday every year, we wave our own palm branches and sing alleluias to remember this holy day.

Karl Graupner captured the energy and enthusiasm of the entrance into Jerusalem in a unique way. The crowd surrounding Jesus is composed of people from many different cultures: there is an Arab with a turban, an American Indian girl, a Frenchman, an Oriental man, a Turk, an Irishman, and others.

Just as people around the world celebrate this holiday today, different cultures are represented in the wood carvings, reminding us that Christ came for all and one day all nations will again wave palm branches and praise him. As it says in Revelations 7:9-10:

After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude that no one could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed in white robes, with palm branches in their hands, and crying out with a loud voice, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!"

One of the characters carries a beer keg on his shoulder. This German-looking figurine is full of detail: there is a feather in his cap and the barrel is complete with a plug at the top and another plug at the spigot hole at the bottom. In addition to being an intricately carved character, he carries a deeper meaning—Karl Graupner himself was a Braumeister, or producer of beer, in his early life. As his great-grandson, Herb Graupner, puts it,



“How natural it would be for [Karl] then to want himself and his business represented in his carvings. What more natural place could there be than in the Palm Sunday event when there was excitement, festivity, and celebration. No doubt he felt that a good barrel of German beer would contribute positively to the events of the day!”

Knowing who Karl Graupner was helps us to understand the context of his carvings. He was born in 1926 in Erzgebirge, Germany. As an adult he worked, lived, and raised his family in Dresden, Germany. His business interests took him to Oberammergau in the Bavarian Alps, known for their woodcarving craftsmen. There he was inspired by what he saw and that soon developed into a new lifelong hobby. He began carving in 1850 when the first of his thirteen children was born. He continued carving for over forty years, slowly adding scenes and characters to the collection until 1895. His materials of choice were basswood and sugar pine. Wood carving was his hobby, but his creations were more than just interesting figures, they proclaimed the message of the Savior that Karl knew and loved. His great-grandson Herb shares:

“Whether he consciously determined to proclaim such a message when he began his forty year work can no longer be known. It is obvious, however, that Karl Graupner was a man of deep Christian faith. He looked to and trusted His Savior for all He came to accomplish on behalf of poor sinners. Such a sinner was he and those whom he fathered. He wanted to share the good news with his family.

As the project evolved over the years, his knowledge of Scripture along with his imagination and artistic ability declared continually to those he loved: ‘Jesus Christ is our Savior and Lord!’”

With his creative twist on the classic account, Karl Graupner helps us to look at this story in a different light. We have the chance to see ourselves in this scene. Jesus came to save not only the Jewish crowds who greeted him enthusiastically, but every nation and tribe on the face of the earth. This scene reminds us that we are all included in God’s plan of salvation.




Grand Opening

But then there is God's shared wisdom with us: "Love thy neighbor as thyself". He has imprinted that on our hearts. And so we respond in faith, go forth with His blessing to be a blessing.

Stacy, Marta, and Tina are three of our very good friends at Family of God. As we have ministered to them, we find that our lives have been enriched by their friendship offered to us! God has worked His love in our hearts for them as we came to know them – just as He has supernaturally bound us all together in love at Christ Our Savior.

A few words about each of them:

Stacy's life was ravaged by drug addiction, she has had many crushing losses in her life – but now she is quite a few years clean and sober – giving all credit to Pastor & Susan Hill, the grace of God and her Family of God congregation.

She is all about restoring her life. She is, and has been, regularly employed, has a husband she is committed to and grandchildren to adore. Life isn't perfect for Stacy, but it is good, and certainly better than it used to be. She knows her strength is in God and grows her faith by regularly hearing His Word in women's Bible class and Sunday worship.

Tina is a 'pillar' of Family of God! She knows everyone, everything about the neighborhood, and 'all the ropes' at

Family of God. Challenged in reading skills, but working at improving, she regularly does the Scripture readings for Sunday service (which makes me so proud of her!) She works hard with meal preparation and kitchen organization – Family of God would not run without her!

Another Tina factoid is that Tina is my first and best friend at Family of God. She made me comfortable and welcome when I first, hesitantly began serving there. She was helpful and friendly to me, and I'm grateful to Tina for smoothing the road for me at Family of God and also being my friend!

Then there is dear, sweet Marta - loved by all!! She speaks no English and understands little of it, but we eagerly jabber back and forth with Marta like we understand one another – and we do, it is the language of love for one another! So then we hug and laugh together!


Even with the language barrier, Marta faithfully attends Sunday church service and weekly women's Bible class! (I figure she understands much more than she lets on!) Marta has four teenagers – 2 girls and 2 boys – and do they ever keep her active and in prayer!!

Marta cherishes her connection to Family of God, it is a life line for her in many ways. She gladly returns her gratitude by cheerfully helping with chores in the building. She loves her pastors, and gives us, from COS, so much love and affection! As do her kids! She's raised them with discipline, a work ethic, and Christian values – God bless Marta!

The little Family of God church is much like a life giving spring in the desert to her congregants – supplying nourishment for body and soul. The people are very grateful for the daily hot meal served them. Importantly, is the spiritual refuge that Family of God provides her people. It is a place of safety, stability, constancy – a welcome relief from difficult, chaotic lives.

We've witnessed the spiritual growth in the women, with whom we share a weekly Bible study (Stacy, Tina, and Marta are long time attendees). They are eager learners, careful listeners, and have thoughtful questions – they are wonderful participants! Their faith is deeper and more foundational than it used to be. Jesus is now a comforting companion in their life's journey, as He is for us, a source of peace, comfort, strength and hope to draw from!



Next Sunday Mrs. Vinson will be soloist for the morning service. The pastor will then speak on "It's a Terrible Experience."


Due to the Rector's illness, Wednesday's healing services will be discontinued until further notice.
