


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hew Every Morning - Rejoice!

Our Savior's Peace

What does it look like to support fellow brothers and sisters in Christ?

When we talk about service and ministry, our conversation tends to focus on outreach and witnessing to unbelievers. This is admirable, and we certainly want to support more efforts in that direction. But there is another field of ministry open to us, one that often goes overlooked simply because of our close proximity to it. The truth is, we are also called to support and encourage those within the church. People who love our Savior and worship in a faithful congregation are still in need of love and support, care and compassion. In fact, the Holy Spirit calls us to serve the household of faith in the words of Scripture:

And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:9-10

Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing. 1 Thessalonians 5:11

But what does this look like?

In our services we occasionally talk about the "whole church on earth." We use the phrase "our brothers and sisters in Christ" and frequently refer to the image of a body that

includes all Christians, each with different roles. From the 50,000 feet view, we see "the church" spread over all the earth and we rejoice in its efforts. When our view starts to zoom in, however, we sometimes lose sight of the "church". Instead of connecting with other congregations, we find reasons to stay insulated within familiar settings. As we rightly enjoy worship and enjoy community within our own congregation, we wrongly find occasions to compare ourselves to other congregations. Instead of viewing the church as a united body working towards the same goal, we too often fall into the trap of individually doing "our own thing" without a thought to cooperation and without stepping back and looking at a bigger picture.

While we can look, of course, at all Christian churches, let's just focus on the congregations of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Did you know that their are over 70 LCMS churches in the metro Detroit area? Did you know we have ministries to the deaf and blind? Do you know about the Spanish speaking congregation in downtown Detroit? Have you visited Family of God to see the ministry to the homeless, addicted, and poor?

Of course, it is impossible to be involved, or even aware, of everything that is happening in metro Detroit, much less in the wide world. But we can still keep our eyes open and out hands ready—God will place opportunities in our path to support the work of His church on earth.



Sometimes that means inviting a neighbor to an event at church. And sometimes that means reaching out to a fellow LCMS congregation. Our lives should be lived with an outward focus. There is a much bigger picture.


You may have noticed that recently a few announcements have made it into our COS Update about events happening at Prince of Peace in Farmington Hills. Maybe you have a personal connection to this church, or you might have visited for an Advent or Lenten midday service. This congregation was established in 1958, and the beautiful sanctuary features stained glass windows that tell the Old Testament and New Testament stories.

These days, this congregation faces many of the same challenges that Lutheran congregations around the United States do—an aging congregation, a large building but small weekly attendance, a desire to grow without knowing what practical steps to take to make that happen. Pastor Mark Schumm, who has served Prince of Peace since 2020, is looking for those practical ways to bring in new members. He approached Pastor Davenport to ask for our help. As one of the larger congregations in our area, Christ Our Savior has resources that others do not.

This gives us a unique opportunity to do ministry.

Ephesians 4:11-16 encourages us:

And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ, so that we may no longer be children, tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in deceitful schemes. Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the



head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love.

In the future, we may hear from Pastor Davenport and Pastor Schumm regarding more intentional ways that we will try to build a bond between our two congregations. We aren't trying to show special treatment to any one congregation or exclude other churches in our area. We are simply responding to a request because that is what brothers and sisters in Christ do. Lord willing, we would extend this same attitude towards all of the churches in our area.

As we wait for developments from our leadership, what can you do?

- Visit Prince of Peace for a movie night, held monthly on Fridays. Dates, times and movie titles will be announced in the COS Update. They have a large room with a big screen TV to show the movies. And I hear the popcorn is free!
- If the location is good for you, consider hosting your small group Bible study or event at Prince of Peace. They have lots of beautiful rooms in a variety of sizes space for small, medium and large groups to meet. There is also a well-cleaned and organized nursery for small children. Much

of the time these rooms just sit empty, so if we can make use of them, all the better!



- Get to know some of the congregation members from Prince of Peace, and invite them to events at Christ Our Savior.
- If you have family or friends in the Farmington Hills area, invite them to one of the services at Prince of Peace! Attend once or twice to help them overcome the awkwardness of going to a

new church alone, and then pray that God will help them make connections of their own in that congregation.

Pray for this congregation. Pastors
 Davenport and Werner include prayers for
 our district congregations in church on

Sunday, but include them on your own as well! Pray for an increase in membership, for their members to be bold in sharing their faith, for opportunities to reach out to the community, and for more ideas on how our two congregations can connect and strengthen each other.

We're calling this initiative *Our Savior's Peace*, a combination of the names of the two churches, Christ Our Savior and Prince of Peace. May this title be a blessing on this endeavor, and also a reminder.

Beauty in the Ordinary

2024 Woman of the Year

What does a life of service look like?

If we stop to think about our own lives, we soon realize that we surrounded by others who serve Pastors, neighbors, family members, even waitresses and cashiers aid us every day as we go through our routines. Sometimes, the service of others becomes swallowed up ordinary lives, and we forget to marvel in its specialness. Because their

service is so regular, and they expect no recognition, we can overlook their efforts. And yet, there is something indescribably beautiful in these "ordinary" acts of service that come from selfless hearts, from an honest desire to help others.

Every year Christ Our Savior celebrates the women in our congregation who exhibit an attitude of service throughout the year by helping with various ministries. We have a large congregation and a small staff, which means that much of the work that happens here is

accomplished by the hands of volunteers. The Woman of the Year title is an opportunity to recognize some of the dedicated efforts of our

members whose work blends in to the "ordinary" of our lives at church. The staff solicits nominations from the congregation, and from the names submitted selects one woman to be the *Woman of the Year*.

At our Advent by Candlelight event in December 2023, the women of Christ Our Savior gathered to celebrate their Savior's birth with music, friendship, beautiful decorations and good food. Part of the program was the announcement of our 2024 Woman of the Year. We were honored to congratulate Cheryl Tyler on receiving this title. True to form, Cheryl's first comment was that she was "humbled and shocked" to be named *Woman of the Year*. Her actions were focused on helping others, not on receiving accolades for herself.

Bob and Cheryl Tyler are the parents of three children, two boys and one girl. For many years they were members at Grace Lutheran where they attended when they lived in Redford. Their children were baptized and confirmed at that congregation. It wasn't until 2007, after a move to Westland and the graduation of their youngest son from high school, that they started looking for a new church home. At Christ Our Savior they felt embraced and welcomed. The warm atmosphere here, coupled with the solid teaching, led to their decision to transfer their membership. Cheryl remembers that they took home from the services a "Word of God", and they knew this was where they wanted their community to be.

They soon became involved in the life at COS—Bob and Cheryl were members of the choir in years past, and they both still attend Bible studies; Bob on Tuesday evenings with the men and Cheryl on Tuesday mornings with other women led by Susan Thomson. They are both active in a small group with George and Sandy Keil.

When it comes to service, Cheryl's philosophy is, "I help out where I can." This has led her to volunteering with Vacation Bible School year after year, purchasing groceries for our annual CHRISTmas Blessings event, as well as seven memorable years serving as a Stephen Minister. Although that ministry is no longer active at

COS, she has continued relationships with several women informally that she met through that program.



When she retired, she started helping more with the funeral dinner ministry. At Christ Our Savior, there has long been a team of dedicated individuals who shop for, prepare, and serve a meal for those who attend funerals at our church. This is a way to serve the family of the bereaved, who would otherwise have to pay to host their extended family and close friends at a local restaurant or a catered meal. Cheryl, assisted by her husband, Bob, and Yvonne Stewart, leads the team, helping to do the shopping and organizing the volunteers. She is always on call—often springing into action on short notice as funeral arrangements are made.


Now, two of their children have families of their own and still live in the area. Bob and Cheryl enjoy taking advantage of "grandparenting duties" and spending quality time with their children and grandchildren. Their third son serves in the navy, where he is currently going through a linguistics program. Cheryl would certainly say that her biggest hobby is her family, although she also enjoys cooking, traveling, reading, and finding a good deal on the clearance rack.

As I sat and chatted with Cheryl, I realized the beauty that seems to permeate her life—the beauty of ordinary, everyday service. Cheryl doesn't stop to ask what she can get out of an activity, or what recognition she will receive, she simply "helps where she can." I can't think of a better slogan for our *Woman of the Year*.

A Short Proof of the Existence of God





One more definition is needed prior to our discourse. This is the concept of possible worlds. To put things simply, a *possible world* is reality as it could have been. The *actual world* is reality as it is. The terminology can be somewhat confusing. If, for example, there is a multiverse, then there is a plurality of universes in the world. What determines whether a world is possible or not? The answer is *the law of noncontradiction* and the nature of the entities

therein. Worlds that have no contradictions in them are possible; worlds with contradictions are impossible. For example, at first glance it seems that there are possible worlds wherein I had a brother rather than a sister, in which there was no World War II, and even worlds where the speed of light is twice as fast as it is in our world. This is because none of these seem to contain an inherent contradiction. Impossible worlds are worlds in which there are round squares, for example, where 2 + 2 = 17, and wherein Biden both is and is not president at the same time.

Having set the stage, the argument I will make consists mainly in examining answers to three questions. These questions are (1) Is this world the only possible one or are there many, and thus probably an infinite number, of other worlds? (2) Why does anything exist? And (3) Why does God exist?

(1) Is the actual world the only possible world? It seems not. The reason being that the world seems full of contingencies. A contingency in this sense is that things could have been different. For example, there seems to be no contradiction in the notion that you have one more hair on your head than you do. There are seemingly countless ways that the universe could have been different, without contradictions generated. Most of both theistic and atheistic philosophers agree that the



universe is full of contingencies and that therefore things could have been different than they are. In which case, there are many possible worlds. The only way that the actual world could be the sole possible world is if this world were created by a necessarily existing God, and that this is the only world that God would create. and Spinoze are examples Leibniz philosophers who purported these concepts, though in different ways from each other. The biggest problem with this view is that this world is so great, with an infinity of entities and variables, that is it difficult to imagine that there is only this one unique world that a Deity would create. But we really don't know this for certain. At any rate, the God option is not open to atheists, because if one believes in God (as the source of this solo world), one is by definition not an atheist. So, it seems that for naturalism to be true, there must be more than one possible world—and probably an infinite number of worlds.

(2) Why does anything exist? The truth of this matter is of much dispute. Some philosophers hold that nothing contingent would exist on its own. That is, the natural situation should be that there are no contingent objects. If this were the case, then the only way to explain why there is something rather than nothing, why there are vast numbers of contingent things, is to posit the existence of a necessarily existing being who causes contingent entities to exist. However, if one moves in this direction, then one has gone a long way in the direction of theism, and so this is not a viable option for atheists. The other possibility is that there is an infinite number of possible worlds of which one of them had to be actual. The world empty of all concrete (as opposed to abstract) beings is thus only one of an infinite number of options, and thus it is infinitely unlikely that an empty world is the one that is instantiated or actualized.

On theism, God, being the perfect or greatest possible being, exists necessarily and chooses what world he will instantiate. On atheism, there is no being to choose to actualize a world, so which world is actualized is so by chance alone. One problem for atheism is that there seems to be vastly more chaotic worlds than orderly worlds. Since the laws of nature seem to be contingent, why do they hold rather than any other set of laws, or much more likely, no set of laws? Further, given that the actual world and everything in it exists by sheer chance, brutely, without a cause or reason, even though the laws of nature have held up to this point by mere

happenstance, there is no reason why they should not cease at any moment. Indeed, it's astronomically more likely that these laws would fail or disappear. Furthermore, and more devastatingly, given that the universe is here only by chance, there cannot be any *laws* of nature. By definition, if something happens consistently over time by chance, it is not a *law* that this is the case; it is merely a *coincidence*.

Another way of looking at this is to take any object in the universe. For example, take a proton which I will call Bob. Why does Bob-theproton exist at time T1? By chance, for no reason. Why then would Bob also exist at the following moment, time T2. Again, for no reason. There is no causal or necessary relation between objects at different times. Since Bob exists when it does for no reason, there is no reason it would exist in the next moment, or the next and so on. Indeed, it seems that for Bob to exist at all by chance instead of other possible objects, or even nothing at all, is extremely unlikely, and since there is no reason why Bob would remain in existence, that it exists over time is vastly, infinitely unlikely.

Hence, there seems to be no possible way for atheism and naturalism to be rationally plausible. Ergo, theism must be true.

(3) Why does God exist? Since there is no other explanation as to why an orderly universe exists and continues to exist, even remaining consistent over time, then God as the GPB must exist. He exists because his non-existence entails contradiction. Being the GPB, having sovereignty over everything, he must exist in all worlds. Another way to look at this is to ask how God could fail to exist. He cannot fail to exist by chance, for then God would not be the greatest possible being. Just as having six faces and 8 corners is included in the concept of a game cube (i.e. die), so is necessary existence included in the concept of God as the perfect being. And a being whose existence is a matter of chance cannot be a necessary being. Nor can anything destroy him or prevent him from existing. The only way that God could fail to exist is if the concept of God is self-contradictory. We have seen that there are no contradictions in the concept of God, because God must exist to cause the universe. No other explanation for the universe works. So, if there contradictions in the concept of God, God exists and exists necessarily.



The Vital Role of Age-Specific Ministries in





This month I wanted to highlight a third principal...one that may be pretty familiar to you: "Age-specific and affinity ministries, when done well and placed in their proper context, are vital to the overall ministry of the church." These specialized ministries, such as men's/women's ministry, children's ministry, youth ministry, and our Forever Young ministry at COS, play a pivotal role in fostering spiritual growth and community engagement within distinct age groups.

I don't think this principle is difficult to grasp, because many of us grew up in churches that had active children's ministry and youth

ministries. We have fond memories of VBS, lockins, bible studies, retreats, mission trips, etc. And while young people are busier and may not feel as much of a need socially to be part of our Children's or Youth ministries, there is still an important role for these groups today. There is a need for all of us to meet with people who are a similar age or gender. Forever Young has done a wonderful job of filling a need for our older members to get to know other people at COS and grow in relationship with them. Our wonderful women's and men's ministries have also done this wonderfully for the men and women of our congregation as well! It turns out that age-specific and affinity groups are great settings to bring friends who might not know Christ, so these groups find themselves working in an outreach capacity.

The only major problem with age-specific/ affinity groups in congregations is that we can get so focused on building these groups that we forget about the other aspects of family ministry. It is important to find that delicate balance between growing our age-specific ministries, fostering an intergenerational church body, and encouraging families to grow in their faith at home. It's not easy, but this balance can be achieved.

Next month I will finish up this particular series of Disciplegram articles. Hopefully, though, you are starting to get a picture of what Family Life Ministry can look like!

LWML MICHIGAN—GRANT HIGHLIGHTS

Expanding Christ's Love for the Aging & Unchurched in Michigan Worship Anew (Lutheran Ministries Media)

Through Lutheran Ministries Media, Worship Anew was originally under the name Worship for Shut-Ins and began airing in 1965. This is a 30-minute weekly television program which follows the biblical doctrine as presented in the Lutheran Confessions and articulated in the Book of Concord. Worship Anew is taking God's Word to a growing population of the aging, unchurched, and those in need of hearing the Gospel (Mark 16:15). They seek to expand the sharing of Christ's love through television ministry in Michigan. 


