

Battling the devil - Review Ephesians 6:10-20

- Spiritual warfare
- Paul compares battling sin and the devil to ancient soldiers battling opponents.
- Ancient soldiers needed to be strong, confident, and take a stand when fighting the enemy. Paul tells us to do the same thing.

Battling the devil - Review


Stand Firm

- "Community" church (our congregation) and Church (Christians everywhere). We are stronger together, just as soldiers are stronger when they are part of an army. – verse 18
- "Community Leadership" just as an army needs officers to lead, so the Church needs leaders too.

Battling the devil - Review

What are some ways we can support our leaders in the Church?

Verse 14



The belt of truth

We have a just cause on our side – **truth**. As was discussed last week, the belt holds everything in place, just as God's truth holds everything a believer needs together.

Verse 14



The breastplate of righteousness.

When in battle, protecting your vital organs was second only to protecting your head. A strong breastplate protected your body from damage. Last week we talked about how a moral life, a life filled with service to others (both signs of righteousness) protects you from evil attacks.

The breastplate of righteousness.

• Matthew 5:16 – what do the good works do?

Verse 15



Feet fitted with readiness from the gospel of **peace.** This readiness comes from the peace of knowing that you have been made right with God. This peace can make you ready not only to stand firm in the Lord but also to share that peace with those around you. You have been given readiness to persevere in pursuing Christ. And even though you are in a battle, you are a minister of a gospel of peace.

1Peter 2:9

Verse 16



The shield of faith. Every attack Satan launches at you can be blocked by faith. By simply trusting in the Lord — and acting on that trust you create a barrier that the enemy cannot penetrate. This doesn't necessarily mean that you'll never suffer difficulty or harm, but in the midst of these trials, don't let the enemy shake your confidence in God's goodness and plan.

Verse 17



The helmet of salvation. The head is the other vital area that a soldier needs to protect. What's interesting here is that you protect your head with what's inside of it: the knowledge of your salvation. If you are a follower of Christ, the Lord has already delivered, redeemed and liberated you. Satan's armies can never do anything to take that away from you. This means that while he may attack you, his plans are ultimately futile.

Verse 17

The sword of the Spirit. The one offensive element of God's armor is the sword. Paul tells you that the sword of the Spirit is the Word of truth. He's not telling you that you should attack people with God's Word. Rather, as Jesus demonstrated during His temptation, you counter the enemy's attack by relying on scriptural truths. And as you proclaim God's truth,

the Spirit goes before you.

Verse 17

The sword of the Spirit.

- Hebrews 4:12 a powerful weapon.
- Matthew 4:1-11 notice how Satan tries to use the sword.
- 1 Peter 3:15 notice how we are to use the sword.
