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# "Help Wanted: Co-laborers Awaiting Our King"

Legend has it that, prior to his daring expedition to the South Pole, 20<sup>th</sup> century explorer Ernest Shackleton placed this advertisement in the classified section of the newspaper: "Men wanted for hazardous journey. Small wages, bitter cold, long months of complete darkness, constant danger, safe return doubtful. Honor and recognition in case of success." As the story goes, men answered this advertisement in droves. Whether or not those exact words ever ran in print, there is something refreshing about an invitation that doesn't sugarcoat the cost. There's no bait-and-switch here. Just a clear-eyed call and the promise of a worthy end.

Maybe I can learn from that kind of honesty in how I present the path of discipleship. Jesus certainly used this level of blunt honesty. He spoke of crosses, narrow roads, and seeds that have to fall into the ground and die before they bear fruit. The kingdom isn't a hobby but a calling. And strangely, when we tell the truth about the work, people don't run away. They lean in.

So here's a church-volunteer version in the spirit of Shackleton: "Volunteers wanted for ordinary work. Long months of steady effort, encouragement intermittent, applause unlikely. Expect your patience to be stretched, but friendships deepened. Eternal impact for others and yourself.

Glory not guaranteed to us but all given to Christ."

That's the reality of church service. You show up early. You stack chairs. You rewrite a lesson because the third-graders didn't track last week. You practice music when your voice is tired. You take a casserole to a house no one notices. You don't get a medal. But you do get formed. You learn how to pray with people, and you discover

We don't serve to earn God's love. We serve because, in Christ, we already have it in full. And love wants to work.

As I write this, the Advent Season is fast approaching. And, we should be clear: this time of year is not merely cookies and Christmas pageants. Those are good gifts, but they're not the whole story. Advent is full of "bitter cold, long months of complete darkness." Some homes feel emptier than they did last year. Some burdens feel heavier. Advent is a cold, dark time, and it's a time of work.

Advent reminds us that we are keeping watch in the long, cold dark as we await our King. We are at our posts: preparing the way, praying for our city, teaching children, visiting the lonely, setting tables, practicing songs, repairing what's broken, counting offerings, working the tech booth. It isn't all glorious. But He is all glorious. The Light does shine in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

As we work, we serve the King who has already come. Jesus was born in a manger, laid in straw, stooping into our darkness to lift us into His life. He has come, and He comes still: in His Word that recreates us, in His Supper that sustains us, and in His Spirit who refuses to let the cold darkness have the last word. He meets us all, and he invites us all to join in this road of discipleship.

Here is my straightforward advent call to you: do the work God has given you. If you are in a cold, hard, difficult stretch—then hear this Advent promise: that is exactly where He loves to work. Not after you've tidied up your life, but in the middle of the mess. Not once the darkness lifts, but while you're learning to strike the next match of faith. He is not embarrassed by your need; He is eager to fill it. Show up once more than feels convenient. Pray for a new person by name. And if you're already serving, don't look for a stage; look for the next small, faithful thing and do it with love. Your labor in the Lord is not in vain.

The days are short. The work is real. The King is near. Let's ready the way together.

## Homebound Ministry

Did you know that Christ Our Savior has a Homebound Ministry? Do you know what they do? Is there room in your heart for this ministry?

First let us explain what the Homebound ministry is.

The Homebound ministry is lay person ministry that serves as an extension of our pastors. Our pastors regularly visit and provide communion for those unable to attend church in person.

The main focus of this lay person ministry is to bring the fellowship of like believers to the homebound places of residence. Homebound ministry began humbly in 2008 with the team delivering gift bags for Christmas and Easter as well as a

poinsettia and Easter lily. Since that time the ministry has expanded into many other connections. This typically involves sending cards on holidays and birthdays, making phone calls, providing lap quilts, and delivering special devotion packages during Advent and Easter (they also contain goody bags of

snacks). These devotions will follow the midweek church sermon series which can accompany the online videos of the church services. Some visits do not have to be related to a specific event, but can be a check in to say hello. Also, coming next year there will be the addition of Fur Blessings visits. Whatever the circumstance, the point of the ministry is to bring the fellowship of COS members to the homebound as a community of believers.

I do like chewing on stinky slippers and shoes. (Steve calls me "Destructo"—when I'm not constructively busy). I'm really quite a happy dog, and people say I'm really cute or "adorable". All I know is that I LOVE people (and all kinds of animals, too). I have come to know many people in our neighborhood. Loving them comes so naturally to me.

I guess maybe the Top Dog of COS's Fur Blessings Natalie Hansen, saw some potential in me even just from a photograph. She immediately asked about my being part of this new and exciting project of blessing people with furry friends. Well, I guess I qualify as furry, or fluffy! And every time I see someone new, I want to get to know them! My tail keeps wagging. I just can't help it! I also have the problem of short dog syndrome—I want to jump up on people. But I guess that's not okay, most of the time. So, I needed some training.

I really enjoyed my "Canine Good Citizenship" training with Katie. You might have seen us all training together on Wednesday evenings this summer. I learned to walk nicely, sit and stay, "place", lie down, go up and down stairs, enter and ride an elevator, and to come when called. The hardest thing to learn was "off"—to not jump up on people. I just want to meet them! After 8 sessions with Katie, I was ready to attend the big, once-a-year weekend training for Therapy Dog certification. It was RUFF! There were lots of other dogs there, too, but we couldn't say "hi" to each other. We were there to work.

We all had to learn to get on a public bus and how to sit in

different "seats". We weren't on the seats. The people (they called them "handlers") were. We had to fit into the spaces at their feet. I lost count (wait, I don't know how to count...) of how many times we had to go on and get off the bus! We all got pretty good at it.

Then we went to the Flint airport and learned how to go through security. I had to lie down in front of the metal detector and wait for Elenn' to go through first, and then go to her when she called. Katie had trained us very well on this. We did great!

Probably the best part of the day (besides the rest time in the car between places) was the time at the Village. It was an outside mall, and we got to see lots of people. I got so much loving! I guess that's because I give so much loving. Oh, that's probably the point! I guess I'm getting to be a pretty smart dog!

The second day Elenn' and I had to show that we could weave around paper plates of freshly cooked cut pieces of sausage without going after the yummy meat. Now THAT was ruff! But I was very good and followed instructions, and went away hungry. Sigh.

Stairs were the next task. We had to go up and down stairs and stop many times, showing that I could "heel" even on the stairs.

Later, we went to a fire station and had to get up close and personal to the loud fire engine. We even walked beside the fire truck when the sirens were blaring!

And then, we got the good news: we ALL passed! After all of my training, I got 3 ribbons from the American Kennel Club: Canine Good Citizen, AKC Community Canine, and AKC Urban Canine Good Citizen. Now Elenn' and I have to "shadow" experienced teams on 10 different events to get the final clearance to go out on our own visits.

# Leaning Into the Hard Questions:

Challenge as Part of Family Discipleship

"Why does God allow bad things to happen?" "I'm not sure if I can believe in Hell." "How can we trust the Bible when it was written so long ago?" "What about people who never hear about Jesus?"

In 20+ years of working with people of all ages in a congregational setting, I've discussed questions and doubts like these quite frequently. I've wrestled with them as I've led various high school youth groups, sitting on old couches with teenagers brave enough to voice what they were really thinking. I've had these very same conversations with college students in my office at Concordia. Most recently, the question of "Why does God allow bad things to happen?" came up in a group of older adults I was with—proving that wrestling with hard questions isn't just a young person's journey. It's a human journey.

Questions and doubts like these often make us pause and swallow hard. They're uncomfortable. They don't have easy answers. And if we're honest, sometimes they touch on areas where our own faith feels a bit shaky.

Challenge: A Mark of Healthy Ministry

I mentioned in a Disciplegram a year ago how the

LCMS identified "Challenge" as an important part of effective ministry to youth (though I truly believe this applies to everyone regardless of age). The LCMS defined 'challenge' this way: "Challenge is being willing to engage in tough spiritual conversations. Standing firmly in God's Word, it faces the questions and confusion we experience living in our current culture."

But here's the thing: while we may intellectually agree that challenge is important, we often struggle to actually practice it—especially in our homes. I'm convinced that one of the main reasons we avoid having the necessary spiritual conversations with the people we love is because we're afraid of being asked the tough questions. Questions we're not prepared for. Things we might have learned in Sunday School or Confirmation class a looonnng time ago but have totally forgotten the answers to.

So instead of engaging in faith conversations, we don't even bring them up. We focus on sports, movies, pop culture, or a hundred other safe topics instead. This is a natural human response—self-protection against feeling inadequate or foolish. The irony is that by avoiding these conversations to protect ourselves from feeling inadequate, we may

inadvertently communicate to our loved ones that their questions aren't welcome or that our faith can't handle scrutiny. We don't mean to send these messages, but our silence can speak louder than words.

So what can we do? Well, here are some thoughts on how to create space for "challenge"—in our homes, among our friends, in our community, and within our church family. I didn't want to ask Alyssa for five pages in the Disciplegram, so these are just a few suggestions.

#### It's Okay to Say "I Don't Know"

I've shared this before, but let me say it again: you don't have to have all the answers. When someone asks you a difficult theological question and you genuinely don't know the answer, it's perfectly acceptable to say, "That's a really great question, and I honestly don't know the answer. But I'd love to explore it with you."

This response validates the question, models humility, keeps the conversation going, and turns the moment into an opportunity to learn and grow together. Young people (and people of all ages) respect honesty far more than they respect fake certainty. When you admit you don't have all the answers but you're committed to seeking truth together, you're modeling what genuine faith actually looks like—a living relationship with a God who is bigger than our complete understanding.

#### Find Trusted Friends and Mentors Who Can Help

We don't have to navigate tough questions alone. God designed us to live in community for this very reason—we need each other's wisdom, experience, and perspective. If you don't have it already, think about building a small network of trusted people you can turn to when hard questions come up—mature Christian friends, pastors, people from church, etc. At the very least, these trusted people can be praying for you as you navigate difficult conversations with your children or with others. But often, they can offer insights, point you to Scripture passages, recommend resources, or simply encourage you that it's okay to wrestle with hard things.

#### Utilize Available Resources

We are blessed to have many resources available to help us address challenging questions. Our church library is full of books on apologetics, Biblical commentaries, and study materials for all ages. Our church staff, including our pastors, are always open to help you work through difficult questions and would be grateful you're taking your faith seriously enough to wrestle with it. We also have many lay members who are students of Scripture and would

consider it a privilege to share what they've learned over decades of faithful study. Online resources—like Lutheran Hour Ministries (lhm.org) for example—can also provide solid perspectives, though it's important to ensure you're consulting trustworthy sources that stand firmly on Scripture.

#### Pray for Courage

At the end of the day, leaning into tough conversations requires courage. It takes bravery to sit with someone in their doubts without trying to immediately fix them or make the discomfort go away. But here's the awesome truth: the courage we need doesn't have to come from within ourselves. We can pray for it. We can ask our Heavenly Father who already knows our fears and inadequacies to give us the courage we lack. We can pray before we sit down to have a difficult conversation with our teenager. We can pray as we drive to meet with a friend who's struggling with doubt. We can even pray quick prayers in the moment when we're caught off guard by an unexpected question. My kids will tell you that "Lord, give me strength" is a quick prayer I've prayed many times in these moments. We can take heart that all throughout scripture the Lord promises to give us the strength we need for the tasks that He calls us to.

#### Extending Grace

Finally, remember that God's grace covers this too. You're going to mess up these conversations sometimes. You'll say the wrong thing, lose your patience, or give an answer you later realize wasn't quite right. That's okay. We're all still learning, still growing, still being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. The goal isn't perfection but faithfulness—showing up, being willing to engage, and trusting that God can work through our imperfect efforts.

So, I know these suggestions may be pretty obvious, but I hope they help give you a bit of confidence and direction when you come across difficult faith conversations with others. Ultimately, I pray that our individual homes, as well as our family of faith here at COS, will be places where challenge is welcomed where questions can be asked, where doubts can be expressed, and where we walk together toward deeper understanding and stronger faith. Because when we stand firmly in God's Word while facing the questions and confusion of our current culture, we're not just engaging in some intellectual exercise. We're living out what it means to love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength—and loving our neighbors (including our family members) as ourselves.

Pastor Geiger shared powerful stories throughout the weekend that really connected with our students. One story that particularly stood out was about a 14-year-old boy in juvenile detention who had been an accomplice to murder. This young man had believed the lie that nobody liked him. Pastor Geiger ministered to him and helped him learn the grace of Jesus, reminding him that "God specializes in people who screw up. He's the one who saves us when we can't save ourselves." What a beautiful truth for all of us to remember!

Throughout the weekend, Pastor Geiger encouraged

our students to memorize Galatians 2:20 and Galatians 5:1. We would encourage you to try to do the same! These verses beautifully capture what it means to be freed in Christ and to live in that freedom.

Of course, confirmation camp isn't just about sitting in sessions. Our students had plenty of time for games, free time options like disc golf with Pastor Joel, and just hanging out together. There was even a trivia night led by the camp's program director Steph (fun fact: she's a 7-time Jeopardy champion!). These things made the weekend a lot of fun!

One other particularly meaningful experience happened during Sunday's worship service. Each church group participated in a "Baptismal Remembrance" where Pastor Joel marked our students' heads with the sign of the cross using water from Lake Michigan, helping them remember their baptism. Following this, Pastor Geiger had everyone empty a bag of sand outside that they had filled the night before. This represented how our sins are forgiven and we no longer have to carry the weight of our sin anymore. Beautiful imagery that our students could see, touch, and experience!

Overall, it was a fantastic weekend of fun, fellowship, and growth. Retreats like this one provide opportunities for deeper conversations, meaningful connections, and focused time in God's Word that can be harder to achieve in our regular routines and rhythms of life.

We pray all of our students and adults remember the truth that echoed throughout our time together: If the Son sets us free, we are free indeed! What a gift! What a privilege! What a calling!

enjoy traveling around the U.S.


for the last 12 years and we're looking forward to raising our kids here and making new connections with other families!



## News from Family of God


