Michigan District Convention



Every three years, the Michigan District of the LCMS holds a convention. Over a period of several days, pastors and church workers from the District gather to worship, fellowship, hear updates, and discuss the business of our church body. This year, the convention was held

on the campus of Concordia University Ann Arbor on June 22-24. The location was a bittersweet memory of all the ministry done on Concordia's campus, which ended as the school closed this past spring. Over the course of the convention, different churches were asked to provide food for the attendees. Christ Our Savior organized the lunch meal on Monday and used the opportunity to draw attention to the ministry in Detroit through the churches of Family of God and Pan de Vida and the ministry of the Luke Clinic.

On Monday, June 23rd Esther and I, along with a group of about 20 other adults from COS, participated in a volunteer event to setup and serve a buffet lunch to the attendees at the Michigan District Convention held at the CUAA campus grounds. The lunch was set up under outdoor tents on the east side of the campus; our group was responsible for setting tables, supervising the buffet lines as the food was served, and cleanup afterwards. Several hundred people were served in all...it was a busy few hours, but we all received many compliments on the food and the service provided. Turns out it was a very hot day, and with the lunch outdoors we definitely felt the heat; fortunately, we were under the shade of the canopy tents and the Lord provided a good breeze that refreshed us all! (And plenty of water was available!).

This was to be one of the last opportunities to spend time on the CUAA campus, as they have officially closed their doors at the end of this recent school term. This made the event on the 23rd a bit surreal...such a beautiful campus that will no longer be part of the Concordia University system. And at the same time, we observed the participants in the convention exhibiting a real enthusiasm for the fellowship with other convention attendees. Even though facilities and campuses come and go, the future of the Michigan District churches lies in its people and their continued commitment to service to others and fellowship with one another. And with God enabling all this, there's no need to be discouraged about the future of CUAA or any other part of the Michigan District organization...God will see us through and equip us for the work ahead.

I was one of several from COS that attended the Michigan District Convention this past June. It's important to attend not just so that one knows what's going on, but to be built up in faith with other brothers and sisters in Christ, through worship, study, and fellowship.

The most moving part of every district and synodical convention, to me, is the memorial service. In this service, the ordained and commissioned saints who were called to their eternal rest, since the previous convention, are remembered. It's touching, moving, brings a lot of reflection, and thanksgiving.

However, in this convention this emotion was usurped by the references to CUAA in multiple resolutions, in conversation, by President Harrison who stated he had a level of discomfort being present, and by just being on the main campus.

A funeral pall represents the deceased' baptism and the hope of the resurrection. I look at the convention as the pall covering CUAA's coffin.



The school was not baptized per se, but it was dedicated to the glory of God. It was blessed and celebrated as it opened its doors. The school was alive and the Church was blessed as many who passed through those doors went into church work or into the secular world living according to God's will. In addition, many unbelievers became baptized believers.

The school is not what it once was. It was said that this was the last Michigan District Convention to be held on this campus. It isn't yet known what will become of the main campus, but there is hope of it re-opening in some fashion. Yet, because of CUAA staff, congregations, and students, many came to know Jesus Christ as their Savior and the hope of their resurrection portrayed by a pall is appropriate.

C.A.R.E.S. in Farmington Hills

Sitting back off the road, the converted church building and campus at 27835 Shiawassee Road, Farmington Hills, MI, between Middlebelt and Inkster Roads, is unimposing and easily missed. But the services provided on that 10-acre property have tremendous and daily impact on residents of the surrounding eight communities—Farmington Hills, Farmington, Livonia, Redford Township, Southfield, Northville, Novi and West Bloomfield.

CARES (Community. Action. Resources. Empowerment. Services.) is dedicated to providing vital support services to the residents of the communities listed above. There is a self-service Family Pantry which currently serves, by appointment, 800+ families a month; a Market, open five days a week, where anyone Is welcome to shop for groceries

and 100% of whose proceeds support the Pantry; and on-campus partners, including Colette's Place, Alcoholics Anonymous Outreach, Rebuilding Together, Oakland County Veterans Services, WIC, and Navigation Center.

Even When It All Goes Wrong

Discipleship in the Family

"Be still, and know that I am God. I will be exalted a mong the nations, I will be exalted in the earth!" - Psalm 46:10


Last week during our family meeting, I found myself getting grumpy and snippy with my family as we reviewed

the upcoming week's calendar. As we flipped through the days ahead, marking soccer practices, work commitments, church events, and everything in between, I realized with growing frustration that we were only going to have one sit-down dinner together as a family that entire week. Just one.

I value our time together so deeply—particularly those special moments around the dinner table where we can connect, share about our days, and simply be present with one another. Looking at that sparse calendar of family meals, I could feel the tension rising in my chest. The uncomfortable reality hit me: we were about to spend another week running fast and furious, and I was not a fan of that at all.

Now, I shouldn't have taken my frustration out on my family members. They didn't create this busy season any more than I did—we were all just trying to navigate the demands of life together. But that moment of grumpiness revealed something important: how uncomfortable it can be when we're always moving at breakneck speed, when our calendars are

so packed that the things we value most get




While I'm personally in the thick of parenting teenagers—with all the driving, activities, and scheduling chaos that entails—I'm reminded that every stage of life brings its own version of overwhelming busy-ness. It's easy for people in every season to feel like they're drowning in commitments and obligations.

My mother, who is in her seventies, is also trying to balance all of her church commitments, social engagements, and healthcare appointments. Even in retirement, she finds herself feeling pulled in multiple directions, trying to be faithful to her various responsibilities while also taking care of her health and maintaining relationships. The details change, but that sense of being overwhelmed by the pace of life? That seems to be a universal human experience.

Whether you're a young parent juggling work and toddler schedules, a college student managing coursework and relationships, a middle-aged adult caring for both children and aging parents, or a retiree trying to navigate a new rhythm of life—we all face seasons when the calendar feels more like a master than a tool.





So what do we do when life feels like it's moving too fast? When our schedules are so packed that we barely have time to breathe, let alone connect meaningfully with the people we love? Here are a few practices that I'm trying to embrace, even when (especially when) I don't feel like I have time for them:

Give God our calendar and our time. This might sound simple, but it's actually quite radical. We often approach our schedules as if we're the ultimate authority over our days, making decisions based solely on what seems urgent or what others expect of us. But acknowledging that our time is actually a gift from God—every second, minute, hour, and day—changes how we approach our commitments. When remember that our time belongs to Him, we can humbly ask for His wisdom in how to use it well.

Give God our anxiety. That knot in my stomach during our family meeting? That's the kind of anxiety that God invites us to bring to Him. When we're feeling overwhelmed by our schedules, when we're frustrated by the lack of margin in our lives, we don't have to carry that burden alone. First Peter 5:7 reminds us to "cast all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you." Our busy-ness, our stress, our worry about not having enough time for the things that matter—all of this is something we can hand over to our heavenly Father.

Pray for discernment. Not every good opportunity is a God opportunity for us. Not every request for our time is something we need to say yes to. Learning to discern between what is urgent and what is important, between what others expect of us and what God is actually calling us to—this takes wisdom that comes from spending time with Him. When we pray for discernment about our schedules, we're asking God to help us see our commitments through His eyes.

Pray for forgiveness. Here's the brutal reality: we're going to make poor decisions with our time. We're going to say yes when we should have said no, and no when we should have said yes. We're going to prioritize the wrong things, get frustrated with the people we love most, and sometimes miss what God is trying to teach us through both our busy seasons and our quiet ones. When this happens—and it will happen we can come to God with confidence, knowing that His grace covers even our scheduling mistakes.

The truth is, life is messy, and our schedules often reflect that messiness. But even in the midst of busy-ness, even when we're running from one commitment to the next, God is present with us.

He's present in the car rides between activities, in the brief conversations squeezed between meetings, in the prayers we whisper when we're feeling overwhelmed. He doesn't require us to have our lives perfectly organized before we can experience His peace. In fact, sometimes it's in the middle of our most hectic seasons that we learn to depend on Him most deeply.


So whether you're in the thick of parenting young children, managing the complex schedules of teenagers like I am, caring for aging parents, or trying to navigate retirement—remember that your busy-ness doesn't disqualify you from God's grace. He knows the pressures you're facing, He sees the commitments that are pulling you in different directions, and He cares about both your practical needs and your need for rest.

The goal isn't to eliminate all busy-ness from our lives—sometimes faithful living requires us to be actively engaged in multiple areas. The goal is to ensure that our busy-ness flows from a heart that is grounded in God's love, guided by His wisdom, and sustained by His strength.

Even when we only get one family dinner together in a week.

Connecting with Others in Our Community

The Apostle's Creed in Our Lives, Part 3

The Third Article of the Apostle's Creed brings us through the receiving of faith and the maintaining of faith to the end of our earthly life and beyond. "I believe in the Holy Spirit; the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints; the forgiveness of sins; the resurrection of the body; and the life everlasting. Amen.

In talking to others about faith through the Third Article, we refer to man's sinful condition and that because of that we are unable to believe in Jesus. Man by nature is spiritually blind, dead, and an enemy of God. All we have to do to see this is to look at how often man rebels against God. It is why we need the Holy Spirit to work faith in us. This begins in Baptism when we receive the Holy Spirit and the forgiveness of sins. In Baptism, the Holy Spirit works faith and thus creates in us new spiritual life. "He saved us, not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Spirit." Titus 3:5. This makes us different from others since we are made new and can daily repent and overcome sin to live in true godliness. "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature." 2 Corinthians 5:17.

The Holy Spirit works faith in us. "The Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith." (LSC) We are called and enlightened by the Word of God and strengthened by the Sacraments. These are the gifts given us by the Holy Spirit which we can take comfort in.

This is why coming to church is so important. It is in church that we hear God's Word preached every single Sunday. We draw faith through the Holy Spirit from hearing God's Word. "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the Word of Christ." Romans 10:17.


apostles. The foundation of this house is built upon Christ as its cornerstone. "So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord." Ephesians 2:19-21. This is the communion of saints who are made holy by faith in Christ and work together to serve God.

We are assured through Scripture that God forgives the sins of believers. We simply need to repent. This is done freely by God and not through anything we do. "In him (Jesus) we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of His grace." Ephesians 1:7.

We believe in the promises of God that He will raise us up on the Last Day and give us eternals life in a body made glorious. "But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body, by the power that enables him even to subject all things to himself." Philippians 3:20-21.

One should not feel overwhelmed in using the Apostle's Creed to speak the truth to our neighbors and community. You do not need to use it all at once. But certainly use parts of it to help you explain the faith you have in the Lord and to tell about God, His plan for salvation, and the ongoing work of the church. You may surprise yourself with how much you remember from your youth or when you learned about the Apostle's Creed from Luther's Small Catechism. The Creed is a tool created to help us remember Scripture and to give us comfort in times of trial. Use it as a tool to "share the Word of Christ to all."

In saying that we believe in the holy Christian Church, we are confessing that Christ created a new spiritual house of God, built on the teaching and preaching of Christ and His



New Worker in the Field

News from Family of God

A new member has joined the team at Family of God Lutheran. God always provides, and it is comforting to see another step in his master plan to bring salvation to all people. His ways of working out his master plan are mysterious, and we often don't see how all the pieces fit together until the finished puzzle sits in front of us. Alexander's story is no different.

In high school, Alexander Ogden wasn't sure what he "wanted to do with his life." He ended up on a mission trip to Belize in his junior year. After that introductory experience in ministry, God clarified for him that he was being *called*.

But Alexander's journey to Family of God started long before high school. Although Alexander was raised in Warren, Michigan, his life began on the other side of the world in Kemerovo, Russia. His parents adopted him when he was twenty-two months old after visiting his orphanage. His first English word was "doctor"—he had to visit so many to recover from various ailments he contracted from neglect and malnutrition. This harsh beginning gave him a deep sympathy for those surviving on the streets of Detroit.

After graduating from Concordia Theological Seminary at Fort Wayne this spring, Alexander was ordained into the Holy Ministry on July 15 at St. Stephen's Lutheran in Detroit. His first call was to Family of God in Detroit. Far from the overly organized, committee-filled, potluck-giving, early service vs. late service crowds of a typical congregation in the LCMS, Alexander started as a pastor in the chaos of addiction, homelessness, crime and insecurity. And he loves it. Arriving at Family of God felt like a homecoming for him. He sees the real need to continue the work there, and also gets excited about opportunities for new growth.

As an Associate Pastor, his role is not to lead, but to support those in leadership. Sometimes that means taking care of the less glamourous tasks, including running errands, killing cockroaches or handing out toothbrushes. There are also times, however, when his support role allows him to sit down and talk with people, providing pastoral care and teaching in the faith. He savors the

moments when he can move past charity towards faith in the individuals who come to the church. He also enjoys working with the children—he recalled an experience when one kid came to him asking if he could help during the services. Alexander was more than happy to show him the ropes of acolyting, and at the same time, include him in the rich and

meaningful traditions of our liturgy.

Alexander admits every day ministry at Family of God involves managing crisis' and triaging needs. It's hard to find time to plan and strategize for the future. In those few moments of reflection, though, he looks ahead to a core of regular parishioners. He would love to get past feeding the congregation with spiritual "milk" and get them, at least, on baby food. To help with this goal, he would like to introduce regular prayer services. He knows the people at Family of God have lives filled with change, disruption, and inconsistency, and he would love for the church to be a place of stability. And the prayer services in our Lutheran Hymnal, such as Matins and Vespers, reach back

to traditions started hundreds, if not thousands of years ago. The consistency of people praying these prayers, he hopes, will bring comfort and hope to those struggling to survive in the poorest conditions.

You can meet Alexander on Wednesday mornings when he comes with Pastor Jim and Nick to teach the Adult Bible Class at Christ Our Savior. Or travel down to southwest Detroit to serve a meal with one of our teams who go on the first and fourth Mondays of every month, as well as the second Tuesday.
