



## Reflection Questions

The Fall

Genesis 3:1-19

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This week, we are back in Genesis and will examine the most tragic moment in human history - the Fall of mankind - but we will also discover that even in humanity's darkest hour, God's grace shines through.

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### Reflection Questions:

1. How does Satan's strategy of questioning, contradicting, and then tempting mirror the way temptation operates in your own life today?
2. In what ways do we, like Adam and Eve, attempt to create our own coverings for sin rather than seeking God's provision for forgiveness and restoration?
3. What does Adam's response of blaming both Eve and God reveal about how sin affects our relationships, and how do you see this pattern in your own life?
4. How does understanding Genesis 3:15 as the first promise of the gospel change the way you read the rest of Scripture?
5. The sermon identifies two kingdoms: the seed of the woman and the seed of the serpent. What are the practical implications of recognizing this spiritual warfare in your daily life?
6. How does Satan's fall from wanting to ascend to the highest place to being brought low illustrate the biblical principle that whoever exalts himself will be humbled?
7. In what ways do we minimize God's warnings about sin and maximize His restrictions, just as Eve did in her conversation with the serpent?
8. How does the curse on creation serve as a constant reminder of the fall, and how should this shape our understanding of suffering and work?
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10. What does it mean that God addressed Adam first after the fall rather than Eve, and how does this inform our understanding of spiritual leadership and accountability?
