Main Idea:

On the road to the cross, Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead. This ultimate proof of His identity as the Christ and Son of God caused some to believe, strengthened the faith of others, but hardened the hearts of others and incited them to set in motion the conspiracy to kill Him.
