1. Resolving Peace
(Verses 1-10)



Now this was the custom in former times in Israel concerning the redemption and the exchange of land to confirm any matter..."

Ruth 4:7



As a kinsman-redeemer, Boaz is seeking to resolve peace for Ruth and Naomi.

2. Receiving Peace
(Verses 11-17)

"Blessed is the LORD who has not left you without a redeemer today, and may his name become famous in Israel.

May he also be to you a restorer of life and a sustainer of your old age..."

Ruth 4:14-15a



As the grandfather of King David, this child from Ruth takes his place in the long line of those who prepare the way for the coming of another baby born in Bethlehem.



The peace that these two women received was one of assurance.



We have today the present confidence that "nothing can separate us from the love of Christ" (Romans 8:39); and we have today the future assurance of being "born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3).



As Boaz "bought back" the full rights of Elimelech's family, so Jesus "bought us" back to God through the cost of his life.

We do not lose heart, but though our outer man is decaying, yet our innerman is being renewed day by day. For momentary, light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory far beyond all comparison.
