Romans 13:8-14 ⁸ Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law.⁹ For the commandments, "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet," and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Romans 13:8-14 ¹⁰ Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law. ¹¹ Besides this you know the time, that the hour has come for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed. ¹² The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light.

What does Paul mean by this debt or obligation to love?

Debt of Love

1:1 – Paul the slave1:14-15 – Paul's "obligation" to all

6:12-14, 16, 22 – We are slaves of God 8:12-14 – Debtors to the Spirit 12:1-2 – Presented to God We commissioned by our Master to love others and now owe it to them.

Romans 13:8b

for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law.

How does this text work with Romans 8:1-4? Or Romans 7:4-6?

Righteousness lived in response to righteousness received.

Romans 13:9-10

⁹ For the commandments, "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet," and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁰ Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law.

Galatians 5:13-14

¹³ For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another. ¹⁴ For the whole law is fulfilled in one word: "You shall love your neighbor as **yourself.**"

Matthew 22:36-40

³⁶ "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" ³⁷ And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. ³⁸ This is the great and first commandment. ³⁹ And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. ⁴⁰ On these two commandments depend all the Law and the **Prophets.**"

Moral Duty in Layers

- 1. Romans 12:1-2 Present yourselves
 - to God as living sacrifices.
 - 2. 12:9 Let love be genuine
 - All other duty to others
 - Adultery
 - Stealing
 - Coveting
 - Taxes

Moral Duty in Layers

1. Do not strain out the gnat and swallow the camel.

2. Understand why Paul feels the need to continue giving the law, if we already know the spirit of it.

Three statements about the "time"

- 1. Besides this you know the time...
- 2. Salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed
- 3. The night is far gone; the day is at hand.

This is the last major era of salvation

history. The King's return is next.

 Acts 2:17, 1 Corinthians 7:29, Galatians 4:3-5, Ephesians 1:3-10, 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11, Hebrews 1:1-2, 9:27-28, James 5:3, 1 John 2:18, 1 Peter 1:19-21, 2 Peter 3:3, Jude 17-19.

Christ teaches us to wait with

- immanent expectation of His return.
- Luke 12:35-40 & Matthew 24:36-41

We have good reason for expectation...

2 Timothy 3:1-5

¹ But understand this, that in the last days there will come times of difficulty. ² For people will be lovers of self, lovers of money, proud, arrogant, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, ³ heartless, unappeasable, slanderous, without self-control, brutal, not loving good, ⁴ treacherous, reckless, swollen with conceit, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God,

Matthew 24:23-27

²³ Then if anyone says to you, 'Look, here is the Christ!' or 'There he is!' do not believe it. ²⁴ For false christs and false prophets will arise and perform great signs and wonders, so as to lead astray, if possible, even the elect.²⁵ See, I have told you beforehand.

Matthew 24:23-27

²⁶ So, if they say to you, 'Look, he is in the wilderness,' do not go out. If they say, 'Look, he is in the inner rooms,' do not believe it. ²⁷ For as the lightning comes from the east and shines as far as the west, so will be the coming of the Son of Man.

Revelation 6

- There are 6 broken seals, each with their own meaning.
- 1. White Horse Conqueror
- 2. Red Horse War
- **3.** Black Horse Depression/Recession
- 4. Pale Horse Plague
- 5. A great number of martyrs
- 6. Natural disasters

Revelation 16

- There are 7 bowls of wrath.
- 1. Sores Plague
- 2. Death of sea creatures
- 3. Blood (poisoned) water
- 4. Hotter sun and fires
- 5. Darkness
- 6. Evil is rallied together
- 7. Tremendous natural disasters

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We have good reason for expectation...

Paul gives three things in response to the "time" referenced.

1. Wake up

2. Get dressed

3. Walk in the light

Besides this you know the time, that the hour has come for you to wake from your sleep. For salvation is nearer now than when we first believed.

Remaining awake is giving the primacy of your attention to that which is most pressingly important.

¹² The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light.

Actively expelling evil works.

Dressing for war.

Romans 13:11-14 ¹³ Let us walk properly as in the daytime, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and sensuality, not in quarreling and jealousy. ¹⁴ But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Do not

- Orgies and drunkeness
- Sexual immorality and sensuality
- Quarreling and jealousy
- Make provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires

Do

- Put on Christ
 - Ephesians 5:1-2
 - Colossians 3:5-14

• 2 Timothy 4:1-8

Romans 13:8-14

Leave no debt outstanding.

Love others.

Do this, understanding the time. Wake up, get dressed, and walk with Christ.
