Scripture: *“For God loved the world in this way: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life.” John 3:16 (CSB)*

A Gift That Cannot Be Earned (Day 2 of 3)

Scripture: *"For you are saved by grace through faith, and this is not from yourselves; it is God's gift – not from works, so that no one can boast."* Ephesians 2:8-9 (CSB)

Ever felt like you're constantly trying to prove yourself? Whether it's at work, in relationships, or even just trying to keep up with the Joneses on social media, it's easy to get caught in the trap of thinking our worth is based on what we do. But when it comes to our relationship with God, the rules are different.

Ephesians 2:8-9 hits us with a truth bomb. Let's break it down. "Grace" is God's undeserved favor, His love poured out on us even though we don't deserve it. "Saved" means rescued from the consequences of our mess-ups, from being separated from God forever. And it's all through "faith" – simply believing in Jesus and what He did for us on the cross.

This doesn't mean we can just do whatever we want. It means our motivation changes. Instead of living out of fear or obligation, we live out of gratitude and love. We want to please God, not because we have to, but because we want to.

Grace isn't an excuse to slack off; it's the fuel that empowers us to live a life that truly matters.
