This powerful message takes us on a journey through the essential elements of Christian unity, beginning with a simple yet profound question: What does the Bible say? Just as an electrician must constantly refer back to the code book rather than relying on memory or assumption, we are called to ground our beliefs and disagreements in Scripture itself. The message draws from Jesus's prayer in John 17, where He specifically prayed for us—those who would come to believe through the disciples' message—that we would be one, just as He and the Father are one. This isn't just a nice idea; it's a divine mandate with eternal significance. When we choose unity over division, when we focus on our shared beliefs rather than our trivial differences, we demonstrate to the world that Jesus was truly sent by God. The three pillars presented—being rooted in truth, staying humble, and keeping the main things central—provide a practical framework for navigating the inevitable disagreements that arise in any family. Like passengers on a wooden sailing ship crossing the Atlantic, we cannot afford to sink each other's half of the boat. Our success, our witness, and our very purpose depend on staying together, bearing with one another in love, and remembering that we share one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is over all.
