- 8. Why is it important that the reversal, and the vindication of God that it will bring, is public for all to see?
- 9. How is shame the opposite of gloating?
- 10. Why does it matter that the enemies of Israel specifically taunted them using the personal name of the LORD?
- 11. How should the enemies of God use the time delay of the not-so-instant karma that is coming?
- 12. How should the saints strive to endure the wait? Whose example guides us?
