

Life Groups—Week of May 10, 2026 “A Girl and Her Faith” (II Kings 5:1-1)

1. “The girl was a slave, but because she trusted the God of Israel, she was free. Even more, she was a humble witness to her mistress. Her words were so convincing that the woman told her husband, and he in turn informed the king. Never underestimate the power of a simple witness, for God can take words from the lips of a child and carry them to the ears of a king.” (W. Wiersbe)
2. Naaman suffered from some kind of skin disease but not necessarily what is known by modern people as “leprosy.” There were varieties of skin diseases, all under the heading “leprosy.” Naaman, although a five-star general, needed healing. How is the hand of God seen in this particular need? (v. 1)
3. The young girl may have been about fourteen years old. We are not told her exact age. This girl was in the home of a Syrian as a slave (v. 2). Would you expect that she could help her master?
4. How was the concern of the girl demonstrated? (v. 3) “How often has the finger of a child pointed adults in the right direction. The girl boasted of God and His power!” (D.L. Moody) Can you give an example of what Moody is talking about?
5. Do you see a child-like faith in this girl? What is the evidence of such faith?
6. Naaman had to be humbled before he could be healed. What is the spiritual lesson here? (vv. 8-14)
