August 17, 2025 "When You Have The Lord" Psalm 103:1-5

"It shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant." Matthew 20:26-28

For many people, the leadership experience can be summed up in two words: do better. We all lead, and it's a balancing act, especially for leadership in the church. Those you lead want different things, and the path you lead along is full of decisions, pitfalls, and places where few are willing to go. But that's the idea. You're the leader, so do your job. It's easy to grow cynical with a view like this, and unfortunately, cynicism seems to be a quality all poor leaders have (that and an appalling disregard for the classics—"The Princess Bride" comes to mind, but more on that later).

This year at the Free Lutheran Bible College has been an incredible journey for me. Through serving on Student Council and discussing leadership with Dr. Wade Mobley in the "Thorpe Program," God has gifted me so many ways to grow in my faith. Events, outreaches, Bible studies—each of these things offer ways to see God work in new ways through community and leadership. But what is "leadership" all about? To quote Inigo Montoya, "You keep using that word. I do not think it means what you think it means."

At FLBC, I've learned that leadership is all about people. Nowhere is this more evident than in the ministry of Jesus Christ, and I have found the New Testament studies at FLBC to be just as insightful into the heart of leadership as the classes devoted to leadership. Paul states in Romans 12:3 that we should not "think of ourselves more highly than we ought to," but rather put others before ourselves. Christ emulates this perfectly, providing an example of servanthood, humility, and sacrifice that we call "servant leadership." Christ loved people before He led them. For myself, it is so easy to lead without love, and leadership like this so quickly devolves into cynicism, seeing and expecting the worst in those you serve. It brings jealousy, pride, and hate—all things that not only hinder our relationship with others, but with God. Servant leadership is entirely different. Seeing those we serve as children of God brings peace and joy into our leadership journey. It opens our hearts, draws us nearer to God, and allows Him to work through us more powerfully.

The leadership experience can be summed up in two words: see clearer. See the wonder of serving and loving God's creations.
